Improvements in farm implements which were incorporated into New and his studies made at Agricultural branches of the Ohio State University were reported and published. When the company was sold to AVCO Manufacturing Corporation in October, 1945, Mr. Oppenheim was plant manager. He remained in that position for AVCO and then moved two years before his retirement on Nov. 1, 1949, on Aug. 27, 1969, in his last official appearance for AVCO and the Oppenheim family, he attended the ceremonies in Columbus in which then Gov. Rhodes inducted his father, Joseph, inventor, educator and founder of the New Idea Spreader Company into the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame.

Theodore Oppenheim married Anna Elizabeth Mathias of Carlisle, on April 7, 1920 and has resided since that day 106 North Street in Coldwater, Ohio and after 1945 at Northwood, Ohio and in Carlisle, Ohio during the summers. On April 7, 1970, the couple celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in Denver, Colorado, a site central to their four living families of seven children and 27 grandchildren. For the first time in 1945, the family gathered in Carlisle, Ohio, for the wedding of their daughter, Mrs. J. Vincent, a San Francisco, Calif. businessman and his wife, Joseph Frank M. Oppenheim S.J., professor of philosophy at Xavier University in Cincinnati, Virginia and her husband Ernest F. Barlock, M.D., pathologist at St. Joseph Hospital, Denver, Colo.; St. Ramona Marie, a high school senior at Marykirk College in Mantilla and Ohio; Phillip, a high school senior on mission in Miranda, Philippines; and Joseph D. UK Offers Forestry Technology Program

QUICKSAND, KY.—Sixteen students in the Eastern Kentucky State College are studying for a degree in the forestry program at the University of Kentucky. The students spend the first year of the program in the Community College system, and the second year, they attend the forestry courses at the college. The program was initiated in 1963. The program is sponsored cooperatively by the Community College system and the UK College of Agriculture.

Since the school's founding, the University of Kentucky has added to the facilities, bringing the investment to approximately \$1 million. "Considering the 15,000-acre Robinson Forest, valued at \$3 million, we have a \$4 million facility here for training foresters and wood technicians," Greenlee said.

Graduates of the school have no trouble finding jobs in the wood industry. According to Mahlon Hammer, an instructor at the school, good jobs are available to graduates in cabinet plants, saw mills, furniture making, cooperage firms, and with the Forestal and Forest Service. "We have had 42 students," Hammer said. "In the past, recruitment of students here has been hampered greatly by a lack of living quarters. That the problem has been remedied, we hope enrollment will increase."

Greenlee expects at least 25 students to enroll in the school next fall, with several others having expressed interest. "We haven't really started recruiting efforts in the Community College yet," Greenlee said, "so we're liable to get quite a few more students to enroll."

The usual starting salary for graduates of the school is between \$7,000 and \$8,000, "and that's pretty good for a man graduating from a two-year program," Greenlee emphasized. One "outstanding" graduate, according to Hammer, is now making \$20,000 a year with the Radio Corporation of America. "The demand for our graduates has been great, especially for plea for better roads and safety conditions in western Ohio. 1,750 Is Average Tax Deduction in Nicholas

Nicholas County residents who are getting together their income and expense figures for the past year, in preparation for their annual accounting with Uncle Sam, will be interested in knowing how their charitable and other deductions compare with the average. Those with the \$7,500 level will be deducting around \$1,750.

Of the 17,500 level, the \$1,750 in deductions usually to those with incomes equaling the Nicholas County average shows that \$250 of it is for charitable contributions, that \$800 represents local tax payments and that \$338 is for allowable medical expenses.

The Commerce Clearing House stresses that these figures are merely a guide to what people in various income brackets are listing as deductions. They are not automatically accepted by the IRS. Proper records must be available to support all claims.
