FT. RILEY, KAN. (AP)—Army Sergeant Billy J. Boots, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bishop J. Boots, Route 3, Carlisle, recently completed the Army Tumbler course at Ft. Riley, Kan. The six-week course is part of project transition at the fort.  
Project transition is to provide maximum in-service training of educational opportunities to servicemen during their last six months of duty in order to prepare them to have an occupation when they return to civilian life.  
The course covers the ignition, timing and valves, and the adjusting or replacing of sparkplugs distributor breaker points, and other parts to ensure efficient engine performance. Safety and customer relations are also covered.

Sgt. Boots was separated from the Army on Mar. 4.  
Sgt. Boots, who was last stationed in Vietnam, has been serving as gunner in Battery A, 1st Battalion, 7th Artillery, 1st Infantry Division at Ft. Riley, he holds the Bronze Star Medal.

### Home Economics Program

What is the total Home Economics Program and what does it include?  
The total Home Economics Program includes the seven areas of home economics: F.H.A., home visitation, school and community activities and adult classes.  
The seven areas of home economics are covered by the students each year in their home economics classes. They study food, management, child care, clothing, housing, family relations, and health. Each area is studied separately and the students have the opportunity to carry out many worthwhile and meaningful goals they help to develop.

F. H. A. is a national organization for girls studying homemaking in high schools. Any girl having one semester of home economics may join. F. H. A. provides additional experiences in planning and carrying out activities related to homemaking. The organizations' advisors are the home economics teachers.  
Home visitation is also included in the total home economics program. Visits to the home of the students are made during the summer and the school year by the home economics teachers. This is for the purpose of becoming better acquainted with home situations helping students make use of class instructions in their homes.

Adult classes are sponsored by the home economics department and are usually held at night. The home economics teachers or other qualified personnel are the instructors of these classes. The purpose of this program is to help adults to improve homemaking practices to changing conditions.  
As you can see, the total home economics program is very important and every girl should demand it for good homemaking.

Carelessness causes these accidents  
USE THIS GUIDE TO POISON-PROOF YOUR HOME  
Keep household products and medicines out of reach and out of sight of children, preferably in a locked cabinet or closet.  
If you go out leave the room for only one instant, remove the medicine to a safe place.  
Store internal medicines separately from other household products.  
If you use a single medicine, keep it in its original container.  
Caps, disintegrating tablets, and soft-tablets become loose and break in a child.  
Be sure that all products are properly labeled.  
Read the label before using any medicine.  
Always turn on the light when giving or taking medicine.  
Never combine food and fat with the drug.  
Avoid taking medicines in the presence of children.  
Frequently read and understand labels.  
Refer to medicines by their proper names.  
They are not identical.  
Clean out your medicine cabinet regularly.  
Get rid of old medicines by flushing them down the drain, rinsing the container in water and then discarding it.
