

### 2731 Kentuckians Helped by Easter Seals

Louisville - More and more Kentuckians with communication problems are receiving professional care and assistance from Easter Seal Centers, according to W. T. Isaac, executive director of the Kentucky Easter Seal Society. During the past year, 2731 Kentuckians received help from six Easter Seal centers which provided assistance to those with hearing or speech problems, he reported. Of this total, 2078 were children, he stated.

The Hearing and Speech Center in Louisville, which opened in 1958, served 724 patients during the past year. It includes hearing and speech therapists in its service program. Other centers conducting hearing and speech programs include the West Kentucky Easter Seal Center, Paducah; Northern Kentucky Easter Seal Center, Covington; Cardinal Hill Hospital, Lexington; and the Morehead Speech Center. The Morehead center gave speech screening tests to 1500 Morehead State University students, most of them freshmen and sophomores, in the past year. The school furnishes facilities for college students and is being used more and more each month, Isaac reported.

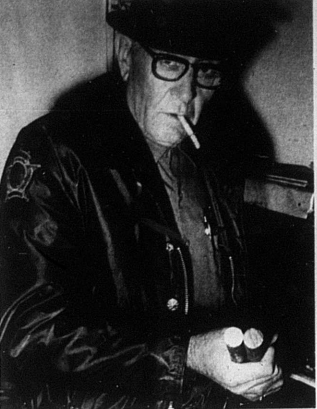

## Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) I moved into a motel with my family for a few weeks while our home was being fixed up after a fire. Is the living expense paid by our insurance for this period also tax deductible?

A) Amounts you received for living expenses from your insurance company may be partially tax exempt under the Tax Reform Act of 1969 if provided that amounts received to offset an increase in your living costs as a result of the fire of your home need not be reported.

Q) I was included as a partner in a partnership where a taxpayer's home is damaged or destroyed by fire, flood, storm or other casualty, or he is denied access to his home by governmental authorities because a casualty occurred or may occur.

A) Yes, in most cases they are added to the basis of the real property and the value of the property is increased. However, under special circumstances the general rule may not apply. For example, in fire cases there is no time limit.

Q) I sent a post card to your local IRS office and for a week while our home was being fixed up after a fire. Is the living expense paid by our insurance for this period also tax deductible?

A) Yes, in most cases they are added to the basis of the real property and the value of the property is increased. However, under special circumstances the general rule may not apply. For example, in fire cases there is no time limit.

Q) I just got a letter saying my 1966 return is being examined. How far can you go back?

A) IRS generally has three years from the date a return is due to assess additional taxes. However, under special circumstances the general rule may not apply. For example, in fire cases there is no time limit.

Q) Where can I get help with my return? I just opened a business of my own.

A) Contact your local IRS office. They have a special publication, "Mr. Businessman's Kit" designed especially for you. They will arrange to meet with you to present your kit and to explain your obligations under the tax laws.

Whether to agree to an amendment to a Bill which increases the public debt limit (H.R. 4690), The Amendment contains changes in the Social Security Act raising minimum benefits by 10 percent and increasing payments for certain persons age 72 and over, both retroactive to January 1971, also making future changes in Social Security Taxes, Year 355, Naya 3. Agreed to, March 16, 1971. Mr. Watts voted Yes.

Supplemental Appropriation for the Department of Labor, 1971 (H.R. RES. 463). Provides an additional amount for Unemployment Compensation for Federal employees and adjustment activities of \$50,675,000. Year 356, Naya 0. Passed, March 16, 1971. Mr. Watts voted Yes.

Whether to agree to an Amendment to Section 2 of the Joint Resolution to supply funds which continue through June 30, 1971 the activities of the Dept. of Transportation (H.R. 468). The Amendment to Section 2 strikes out funds for continuation after March 30, 1971 of Supersonic Aircraft (SSA) Development. Ayes, 217. Noes, 203. Agreed to by the Committee of the whole House, March 18, 1971. Mr. Watts voted No.

A Procedural Note...from time to time the House resolves to enter into the Committee of the Whole House in order to proceed under the Committee's more efficient Parliamentary Rules.

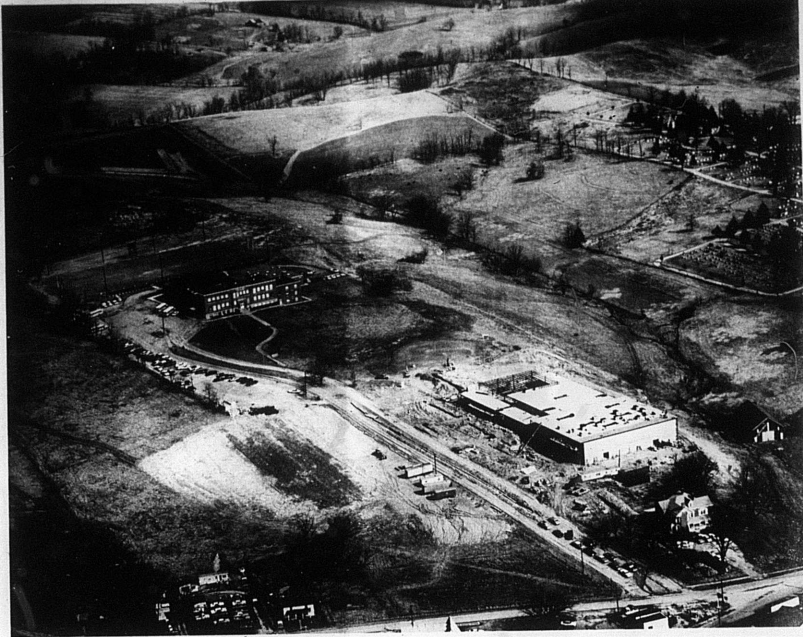

## Commissioner Urges Taxpayers To Use Labels On Returns

Commissioner of Revenue J. E. Luckett has urged Kentucky income tax filers to use the addressed piggy back labels on tax returns filed with the Department of Revenue.

Since the label results in faster processing, it is to the benefit of both the taxpayer and the department. To insure that the label is used, Luckett said.

"This is especially true during the closing days of the filing period when more than half of the one million returns received each year reach the department."

The commissioner also urged those taxpayers whose returns are prepared by an accountant or other tax practitioner to be sure that the label is attached to the return mailed to the Department of Revenue.

Luckett pointed out that the label can still be used even if a correction is required. "Simply draw a line through the error and enter your correction on the label, preferably by pen or typewriter."
