DR. JAMES HENRY STEWART, Dr. James Henry Stewart, 59, died at his home in Greenville, N.C., early Monday morning, March 22, 1971.

He was a native of Carlisle and the son of the late William Berry and Anna Lucretia Gillispie Stewart.

Dr. Stewart was a 1929 graduate of Carlisle High School, received his A.B. degree from Transylvania College, and his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Kentucky, Lexington.

During World War II, he served as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy with duties at Fort Director, and Bureau of Ordnance and Naval Ordnance Laboratory, Washington, D.C. From 1935 to 1936 he taught at Pleasureville Consolidated High School, Pleasureville.

From 1936 to 1946 he was teacher at Elm College, Elm, N.C., and from 1946 to 1951, assistant professor at Washington and Lee University, Lexington, Va. Since 1951 he has been professor of Economics at East Carolina University, Greenville, N.C.

Surviving are a nephew, E.L. White Jr., Lynchburg, Va., and a niece, Mrs. Fred Ramsey of Waynesboro, Va.

The body was cremated.

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18, a beneficiary's earnings, etc. The refiguring of the benefit amounts is being scheduled so as to avoid delay in the regular delivery of the April 3 and May 3 checks, he said. Those checks will be for the amounts payable to beneficiaries before enactment of the 10 percent increase.

By the first of the month, the new records will have been produced by the computers on magnetic tapes showing the new monthly amount for each beneficiary and the amount of his retroactive increase. The Treasury Department will need the month of May to print the checks and turn them over to the Post-Office Department for delivery to social security beneficiaries on June 3.

TOUGH ACT TO FOLLOW

WASHINGTON — It's been more than a year now since Neil Armstrong set foot on the Moon. The accomplishment then, and for several months after the flight, for Neil and his two colleagues, Mike Collins and Buzz Aldrin, has tended to overshadow a subsequent event in the nation's space program.

As they say in show business, that act was a tough one to follow.

Some even thought the landing was the end of the Moon exploration program, remembering that President Kennedy set the goal of a lunar landing and safe return in this decade (the 60s).

But even as the United States planned a Moon landing by the end of the decade, it also was planning subsequent space activities.

While the Apollo 11 crew was still in its post-flight quarantine, the Mariner spacecraft 6 and 7 flew by Mars five days apart, no man engineering and scientific feat. In itself one worthy of great acclaim even though this dual triumph had been preceded by the Moon landing.

Then in November, 1969, Astronauts Charles "Pete" Conrad, Alan Bean and Duke Gordon, on their Apollo 12 flight, duplicated and expanded on the achievements of Apollo 11.

A third attempt to visit the Moon with Astronauts Jim Lovell, Fred Haise, and Jack Swigert in Apollo 13 was aborted when one of its

Household Budgets In Nicholas

How much do Nicholas County families spend per week for food? How much for housing, medical care, clothing and other needs? Are their outlays larger or smaller than those of families in other areas?

Just how high the budget runs for seven family depends upon its income and upon the area of the county in which it lives.

From figures recently released by the American Institute of Public Opinion, based upon a poll, it appears that food expenditures in the East for the typical non-farm family amount to about \$8 more per week than in the Midwest.

Those in the South and the West are in between. Similar differences are noted in other items.

Conservation Cost-Sharing Practices Now Authorized

Requests for conservation cost-sharing practices under the 1971 REAP (formerly known as ACP) are now being taken at the Nicholas County ACP Office, according to Harvey Wagener, Chairman of the Nicholas County Conservation Practices under the 1971 REAP are similar to most of the cost-

sharing practices offered previously under ACP. Emphasis is being placed on Rural Environmental practices and abatement of air, soil and water pollution.

Farmers interested in cost-sharing must make requests before work is started on the practices, thus it is important to stop by the ACP Office and sign-up now.

The program includes provisions of 80% cost-share rate to Low Income families.

The Carlisle Jaycees are participating in "Project Sight", an informational project designed to aid those people in underprivileged countries with defective eyesight.

Chairman Bob Curtis states that the local Jaycees will collect discarded eyeglasses, frames and lenses, which will be sent to a firm that will classify and make new glasses from them.

The rest is for medical expenses, transportation, social security, education and miscellaneous needs.

Among families in the lower income range, food takes a bigger percentage of the budget while housing takes a smaller percentage.

The reverse is true at the higher income levels.

The budget is geared to the typical family of four, including a teenage boy, a younger girl and a wife who does not have outside employment.
