## Burley Tobacco Referendum Passes Locally

Beginning the first week in May, Blue Grass Industries will begin manufacturing the White Stag Speedo brand of men's and women's racing swimwear for the Australian firm's U.S. market. Lines will be set up in Carlisle and Paris to run the initial order.

Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Shumate have just returned from a ten day trip to Australia to gather the necessary technical data for setting up Blue Grass's production lines to meet Speedo's specifications.

Wayne Shumate, president, says, "Blue Grass feels highly honored to have been chosen to manufacture this outstanding line of racing swimwear, which is used extensively in the Olympic contests." He added, "We feel this is opening up a whole new line of operations for us."

Ken Stevenson, Director of Speedo Knitting Mills Pty. Ltd., Sydney, Mike Smith, Industrial Engineer of Speedo; and Fred Markowitz, President of Hirsch-Weiss (Division of White Stag) of Portland, Oregon, were present at the signing of the contract the last of March. This culminates negotiations with the firm for the past six months.

## Burley Tobacco Referendum Passes Locally

The unofficial figures for Kentucky from the ASCS Tuesday evening showed the referendum passing with better than 90 percent of the farmers voting for the plan.

In the eight counties where balloted returns showed a victory in Tennessee where "yes" votes approached 90 percent with only a half of the votes counted late Tuesday night. Six other states were reported at or above the 90 percent mark in favor of the burley tobacco program.

Councils in the following counties voted as follows, "yes": "no", and eligible voters in brackets.

Anderson, 1,000 to 16 (3,500); Harrison, 3,490 to 30 (3,820); Robertson, 1,000 to 11 (1,500); Fleming, 3,400 to 36 (3,500); Bath, 3,430 to 27 (4,000); and Montgomery, 3,471 to 14 (3,600).

Miss Gifford has served on the advisory committee of the White House Conference on Aging; the President's Council on Youth Fitness and served as Chairman of the Commission on the Status of Women in Kentucky in 1964.

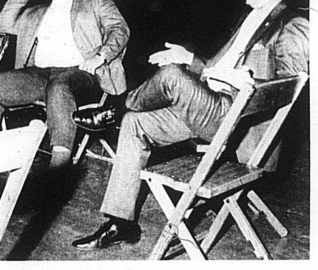

## Sewer Charge Voted for Three Individuals

City Council voted Monday night to levy a \$3.00 sewer charge on three individuals until a more accurate figure can be determined after a six month period.

The three persons were annexed recently into the City, but they use County water which is figured differently from the City rates. Their water rates will be refigured on the City rates for the purpose of figuring a fair sewer charge.

Three building permits were approved at the regular meeting: Gaylord Hunt to build a utility room; Joe Sexton to build a porch and rock walls; and Randolph's Machine Shop to build an addition. All three had previously been approved by the Planning and Zoning Board.

It was announced that all but \$29.29 in City taxes have been collected to date. 1,283 stickers had been sold by Monday night.

Five councilmen were present, Jane Ellen Booth was absent because she was working.

## Postage Rates To Increase May 16

Postage rates on first-class letters will be increased May 16, from 6 cents an ounce to 8 cents an ounce. Postmaster John R. Anderson, announced mailers Tuesday.

Nearly all postage rates, except parcel post, will go up May 16. Rates will be increased from 10 cents to 11 cents an ounce. Postcards formerly requiring 5 cents postage will cost 6 cents. Special delivery fees on letters will go up to 40 cents from 45 cents.
