Kay's Kitchen

With the garden and yard work calling it often felt tired to fix a quickie meal and forget about desserts. However one does need that extra bit of nourishment that comes with something sweet. After all you are burning up more calories with these extra chores that come up this time of year. So enjoy a dessert at lunch time... any time. Here are a few quick ones.

DATE FILLED CAKE

1 package yellow cake mix
4 ounce package butter-coated pudding
1 cup sifted dates (cut up)
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
2 tablespoons margarine
1 package fluffy white frosting mix
Prepare cake mix according to package directions and bake into 9 inch round cake pans. Cool.
Prepare pudding mix but add only 1 1/2 cups milk and add dates and a dash of salt. When done add butter and nuts. Cover and cool.
Cut each layer of cake and spread filling between layers. Ice with frosting mix.

Make a yellow cake mix and serve warm with butter-cream sauce or chocolate sauce. (Sauce recipes were given earlier)

ALMOND FLIP-TOP CAKE

2 teaspoons butter
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup chopped almonds
1 loaf size white or yellow cake mix

Melt butter in an 8 x 8 x 2 inch pan, spread over bottom of pan and sprinkle with sugar; then pour cake mix according to directions. Pour over the mix. Bake at 375 degrees for about 25 minutes. When cool split into 2 layers. Spread with orange filling.

ORANGE FILLING

1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons flour
dash of salt
1/2 cup orange juice
1 beaten egg
1 tablespoon butter
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons grated orange peel
Thoroughly mix together sugar, flour and salt. Stir orange juice. Cook over low heat until thick and clear. You will have to stir constantly.

Stir a small amount of hot mixture into beaten egg, then stir into remaining hot mixture. Cook about 3 or 4 minutes. Blend in butter, lemon juice and orange peel. Cool. Making 3/4 cups filling.

You can use a regular yellow cake mix! Use about half in the 8 x 8 x 2 inch pan. You can make cup cakes with the other half.

ANGLE CAKE WITH COFFEE CREAM

Buy or make—but buy, since we are trying to save time, a 10 inch angle cake. Frost top and sides with this mixture.
2 cups whipping cream

1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 tablespoons instant coffee
1 teaspoon vanilla
Whip cream with sugar added gradually, coffee, and vanilla till mixture holds peaks.
Garnish with grated semi sweet chocolate and chopped almonds.

CHERRY CHEESECAKE PIE

1 8 ounce package cream cheese
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup whipping cream
1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring
1 pound, 6 ounce can cherry pie filling
1 baked 9 inch pastry shell
Beat together cheese, sugar and vanilla. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into pastry shell. Add almond extract to cherry pie filling and spoon carefully over cheese layer.
Chill until set.

COOKIE PIE

One can of cherry, peach or apple pie filling. About 10 or more 1/4 inch slices refrigerated slice-and-bake sugar cookies or any cookie of your choice. 1 teaspoon sugar, dash of cinnamon. Heat the canned pie filling, add any seasoning you desire. Pour into 8 inch pie plate. Overlap cookie slices around edge of pie plate and work into center. Mix sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle over cookies. Bake in 350 degree oven until cookies are done. Serve warm with ice cream or whipped cream.
