The Nicholas County Education Association honored five retiring teachers in the Nicholas County school system Monday, May 3. The teachers are Mrs. Blanche Cameron, Miss Leona Jarber, Mrs. Maxwouen Grimes, Mrs. Laura Mathes, and Otta R. Fryman. The NCEA presented each teacher with a silver pitcher.

Mrs. Cameron has been with the Nicholas County District since 1929. She has served as an elementary teacher here for 42 years. Miss Jarber has 36 years in the educational field. She has served as an elementary teacher and has been librarian of all Nicholas County elementary schools since 1963.

Mrs. Grimes has 20 years experience in teaching elementary and high school. She taught in the Nicholas County District since 1951. Before coming to Nicholas County, she has been on an approved leave of absence the last few weeks due to illness.

Mrs. Mathes has 30 years of service in the Nicholas County schools. She served as principal at Nicholas County Elementary School for two years and has been teaching math at Nicholas County High School since 1964.
Mr. Fryman has 42 full time years experience with Nicholas County and Carlisle schools. He has two years experience of substitution teaching. He served as principal at Headquarters High School in 1937-39. He taught biology and physiology at Carlisle High School during a period from about 1942-1944. He has served as Director of Pupil Personnel since 1940, as Director of Pupil Personnel he serves as trustee and attends a vice officer. During 1965-1966 Mr. Fryman served as acting superintendent for eight months.

Head Start Meet Hold April 27

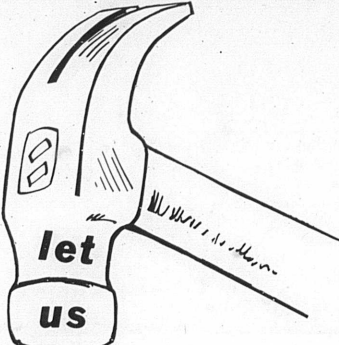
