Small Town News Travels Far And Wide

The following article appeared in the *Pagan Star* and *Herald* recently and was brought to us by Mrs. Oliver, Ky. Crime is so rare in Robertson County that the residents seldom lock their homes or cars.

Sheriff Charles Hendricks rarely gets a call to make an arrest. The county jailer is blind, nearly deaf and can't support himself on his fees for tending the infrequent prisoners.

Mr. Oliver's one-man police force operates two businesses and still has time to go fishing.

In fact only four major crimes were committed last year in this North-Central Kentucky County of 2,163 residents, officials say. There were no rapes, robberies, murders or auto thefts.

"We go two or three months without having a prisoner," said Mrs. Oscar Johnson, wife of the jailer. She lends a helping hand when necessary at the jail.

Fees, which are Johnson's only salary from the County, total about \$500 in 1970 for feeding and tending the key on 15 prisoners. His main income is his social security check.

To ease any financial strain, the County lets the Johnsons live rent free in a white frame building that houses the jail. It also pays for the couple's fuel.

The Sheriff pointed out there was one burglary, one case of assault and two thefts of more than \$50 last year, adding:

"The most excitement we had in quite a while was a pool room break-in the other night. I feel sure it was done by a bunch of kids."

The biggest crime, he continued, "came some time ago when a tv show was entered and something like \$1,200 worth of stuff taken. The shop belongs to Gene Hughes, the one-man police force in Mt. Oliver, who admits the job leaves him only a glimmer of time to run the shop."

run the shop and a restaurant and to go fishing.

Mr. Oliver, the County seat, contains 600 of the County's residents. Farming and retail trade account for nearly all occupations.

"I've never locked a door in my life," said Harry Boyd, a supervisor for Kentucky Gas Transmission Corp. I doubt if we've even got a key to the house."

"My doors are never locked, not even at night," said Mrs. Paul Guthrie. "We've got a good bunch of people. It's such a nice place to raise children."

Gene Livinville has a network of alarms at his bank box, on the other hand said, "I never lock my car here, and usually I'll leave the key in it. Crime is something we don't believe in around here."

Average Family
Small In Nicholas

How big is the average family in Nicholas County? Are local families larger or smaller than those in other communities?

The question of family size, family planning and the placing of limitations on the concentration of biologicals, ecologists and others are greatly concerned about the heavy deterioration of the environment through air pollution, the pouring of waste of the sea, the contamination of rivers and lakes and the rapid depletion of our natural resources.

As voiced by Prof. John Thomas of Stanford University, "When we can see the future, the people we have now, giving everyone enough to eat, to wear, to shelter, to love, purpose and opportunity to achieve and fulfill themselves, we can then talk about more people and larger population--not before."

In Nicholas County, according to the current census figures, which show a population of 6,508 distributed among some 2,140 households, there is an average of 3.04 persons per 100 local households.

This is less than reported for most sections of the United States--the average being 320 per 100 households. In the last South Central States it is 3.31.

The Department of Commerce points out that with mortality conditions as they are now, the number of children born per woman is only one.
