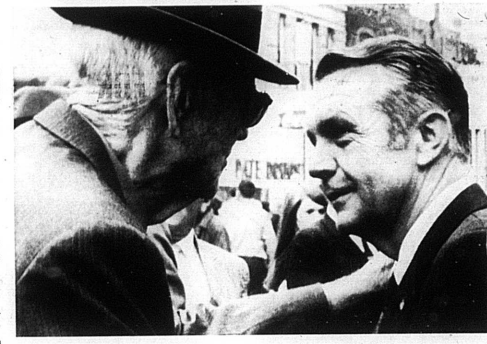

CONGRESS VOTES

"Congress Votes" an impartial newsletter issued every week that Congress is in session. It will cover all votes on record and reports the position taken on each measure by the Congressman John C. Watts, Sixth District Representative.

Week ending Thursday, May 6, 1971.

Whether to accept the rule and pass a bill (H.R. 428) to extend until April 1, 1973 the president's authority to make organizational changes in the executive branch of government. Yeas 301, Nays 20. Passed, May 3, Mr. Watts did not vote.

Whether to authorize the U. S. Postal Service to receive a \$2 fee for handling a passport application (S.531). Yeas 240, Nays 124. Passed, May 4, Mr. Watts did not vote.

Whether to agree to a resolution extending leave without pay for a flaggy 87th Birthday to former President Harry S. Truman (H. Res. 429). Yeas 379, Nays 0. Present 1. Agreed to May 5, Mr. Watts did not vote.

Whether to adopt a resolution (H. Res. 423) to consider H.R. 4604. The latter raises by \$900 million (to \$3 billion) the amount of business loans permitted the small business admin. Yeas 156, Nays 172. Rejected, May 6, Mr. Watts voted ye.

Whether to pass H.R. 4604. Yeas 383, Nays 0. Passed, May 5, Mr. Watts voted ye.

Whether to accept a resolution (H. Res. 412) an amended authorizing additional authority to the committee on education and labor for the purpose of conducting investigations abroad. Yeas 156, Nays 172. Rejected, May 6, Mr. Watts voted ye.

Proceedings of the U.S. House of Representatives... The record of this session, which began Jan. 21, already occupies 3,452 pages.
