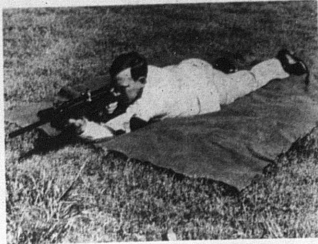


Major Presley W. Kendall Sets New .22 Rifle Record



KNOXVILLE, TENN. (AP)—Army Major Presley W. Kendall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter W. Kendall, Route 4, Carlisle, recently established a new record for .22 rifle target shooting with 120 consecutive bullseyes from 500 yards.

Maj. Kendall shattered the old record of 40 bullseyes at the Southeastern Small Bore Regional Championship here. The new record is recognized by the National Rifle Association and is the greatest number of consecutive bullseyes with a .22 known.

Bullseyes in .22 targets are smaller than the nail of the little finger. The record bullseye shots from the prone position helped Maj. Kendall win the entire championship from standing and kneeling positions as well. He now holds five national championships and plans to compete for selection to the U. S. team in the Pan American Games, set for July in Colombia, South America.

"I practice shooting whenever I get the chance," said Maj. Kendall, a 1958 graduate of the University of Tennessee. "Shooting, hunting and fishing are my recreations."

Maj. Kendall, who joined the Army in 1958, has also been selected by staff officers of the Third Army to appear in the 1970 edition of Outstanding Young Men of America. Criteria for selection include a man's service to others, professional excellence,
