A SENATE INSTITUTION FALLS

One more all male institution has given way in the wake of Women's Liberation. This quarter, United States Senate, after 182 years without girl pages, agreed to admit three of them.
The Senate debate lasted only an hour. There was talk about the lack of facilities for women and concern for the safety of the young ladies whenever they might be required to work late, but in the end there was not a single vote cast against the resolution permitting their appointment as Senate Pages.
For some time opponents had kept the resolution locked in committee since the girls were first seriously proposed last winter. The girl page resolution was passed by the Senate, provides that each Senator be responsible for the girl's transportation to and from the Senate and for their safety and conduct at their residence. Some think this added protection, however, will be unnecessary once the new page dormitory and school are finished, and the three young ladies being appointed hail from New York, Illinois and Oklahoma. They will join the 30 boy pages now serving in the Senate. There are 50 pages in the House Representatives--still all boys.

MEDICINAL PLANTS

"We hold life in our hands with all its infinite possibilities. What are we going to do with it?" Dr. E. Evans Brown posed this question upon the 74 Nicholas County High School seniors at last Sunday night's baccalaureate services.
Dr. Brown, Carlisle Presbyterian Church minister told seniors they could call this point "life at high tide." He said there were certain ingredients necessary to get the most of life.
"We are challenged to be something in ourselves," is the first

ingredient life at its most, Dr. Brown said. Through being something he told the class they have power to hold our sometimes crumbling world together.
Secondly, most great men "took it upon themselves to do something," he told seniors. It is necessary to do something before problems could be solved.
More important than being something or doing something is having something--faith. He said life at high tide calls for having "a faith in yourself."
