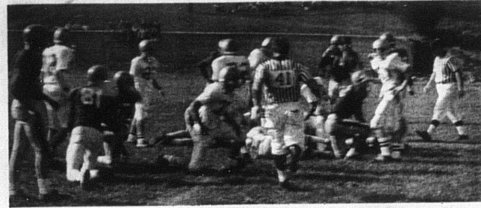

Masonic work Tobacco Festival opens today (Thursday) Nov. 4

There will be E.A. and F.C. degree work at Headquarters Orient Lodge No. 350, Saturday night, Nov. 6, at 7:30 p.m.

Tobacco Festival opens today (Thursday) Nov. 4. 4-H'ers are invited to exhibit their tobacco at the 19th Annual Nicholas County Tobacco Festival to be held on Thursday, Nov. 4.

All members are urged to attend this work. Refreshments will be served, according to Calvin Williams, Senior Warden.

Any 4-H member is eligible to enter the Tobacco Festival which will be held at the Carlisle Armory. All samples of tobacco should be brought to the Armory between 8:00 and 1:00 on Nov. 4. Each sample must contain three hands of each grade and the hands must be made of 12 leaves or more (12 to 20 leaves required).

Premiums will be awarded on the first five places in each of the following classes: Frying Leaf, Bright Leaf, and Red Leaf. (No class for Tips this year, there will also be prizes on the new crop exhibit to consist of all four grades and on the best hand-cut crop (judged on condition of leaf, case, uniformity of leaf, size of hands, neatness, tying and general appearance).

Detailed rules and premium lists are available at the Extension Office and in most of the business places in Carlisle.

4-H'ers are encouraged to enter the Youth Tobacco Grading Contest which will be held at the Armory from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. 4-H members will be excused from school at this time and will be returned before school closes. Members participating must present a permission slip from home to their teachers.

Tris Massie, Tobacco Specialist from the University of Kentucky, will give a presentation during the night program which will begin at 7:30 p.m. The Adams family from Mason County, winners of a recent talent contest in this area, will entertain during the night program. The Festival is sponsored by interested tobacco growers, and by tobacco warehouses and local business people.

Delegates to decide FB policy

Louisville, Oct. 29, 1971: Kentucky Farm Bureau's 1972 policies will be decided by county voting delegates attending the 52nd annual state Farm Bureau convention at Louisville's Executive Inn Nov. 11-14.

Voting delegates representing 120 county Farm Bureaus in Kentucky will establish the organization's policies on state issues during a convention business session Saturday morning, Nov. 13.

Delegates to the state convention will have the job of weighing county Farm Bureau recommendations on key issues into a platform for Kentucky Farm Bureau's 1972 programs, included in this platform will be guidance for Farm Bureau's legislative activities during the 1972 session of the Kentucky General Assembly.

Major topics to be considered by the voting delegates include taxes, tobacco, pollution, education, rural roads and daylight saving time.
