Seat Vacant, 6th Congressional District, Kentucky.  
Whether to pass H.R. 11418 appropriating \$4 billion for military construction in fiscal 1972. Yes 354, Noys 32. Passed, Oct. 27.  
Whether to agree to a rule (H.R. RES. 661) which makes in order the consideration of the Higher Education Act of 1971 (H.R. 7248). Yeas 371, Nays 7. Agreed to, Oct. 27.  
H.R. 7248 authorizes the continuation of existing programs in several new programs. During debate (which will be continued next week) there were two record votes on proposed amendments. Both amendments would change the allotment formula for distributing grants under the Educational Opportunity Program authorized in Title IV.  
On the Que-Frazer Amendment to Title IV. Ayes 117, Noes 257. Rejected, Oct. 28.  
On the Frazer Amendment to Title IV. Ayes 108, Noes 220. Rejected, Oct. 28.

## General Fund Tax Receipts

Revenue Commissioner J. E. Luckett and Finance Commissioner Albert Christen announced general fund receipts for the first quarter of the fiscal year increased 15.5 per cent over the same period in 1970.  
Luckett also noted receipts for the quarter, which totaled \$144,809, 198, were some 4.6 per cent above estimates.

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## Students Reap Benefits of School Building Fund Boost

The past few years have been eventful ones for Kentucky's schools, thrusting them once again into the forefront of public discussion. Reports of this education-oriented activity often emphasized the bad, many times shutting out the good. While campus turmoil and school controversy created headlines, state government moved quietly to assure quality education. Gov. Louie B. Nunn's action doubling the state's capital outlay (building money) for education from \$600 to \$1200 per every 27 Kentucky students, provided local school districts a financial capacity in excess of \$250 million for new and improved school facilities.
