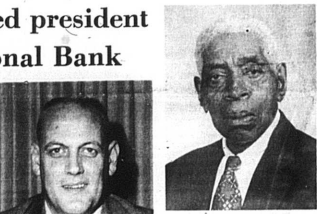

## Tobacco marketing cards

Harvey Wagner, chairman of the Nicholas County ASC Committee, announces that the 1971 Burley Tobacco marketing cards are being mailed to reach the farmers for the official weigh date of Nov. 12. There will be some farmers required to pick up their marketing card at the ASC Office. Farmers having more than one tenant may request additional cards, but this must be done in writing since there must be a designated number of pounds assigned to each card. The burley tobacco market opens on Nov. 22 for the sale of the 1971 crop. This is the first time to use the poundage system and the farmer should take note of the following terms regarding the use of the marketing card.

- (1) The card will show on the front the farm quota pounds or 100% will be shown.
- (2) Tobacco marketed above the 100% will be deducted from the farm's quota the following year.
- (3) Tobacco marketed under the 100% will be added to the farm's quota the following year.
- (4) All tobacco marketed (including gifts) must be recorded on the marketing card. If tobacco is left on the warehouse floor, including rejected tobacco, or pounds over 110% of farm quota will be deducted from the farm quota and penalty due.
- (5) Do not permit anyone to market tobacco on the marketing card which was produced on another farm.
- (6) Present marketing card at the warehouse when tobacco is weighed in and leave it in custody of the warehouse until tobacco is sold. Pick up marketing card at the time payment is received for tobacco.
- (7) Examine the marketing card and sale bills after each sale to be sure the sale was correctly recorded. Report any errors to the marketing recorder at the warehouse or to local county ASC office.
- (8) There is a provision to lease pounds, provided an agreement is signed by both the lessee and lessor. Continued on page 12
