More than two million private land users have built ponds for recreation, wildlife, livestock recreation, irrigation, fish production, and fire protection. A new USDA publication, "Ponds for Water Supply and Recreation," gives hints for developing successful ponds.

Agriculture Handbook 387, prepared by the Soil Conservation Service, describes what to look for during preliminary site selection, detailed site studies, construction, erosion control, and pond maintenance.

Some factors in site selection are: do not build where failure of the dam structure will mean loss of life or heavy damage to property; locate the pond where the largest storage volume can be obtained with the least amount of earthfill; locate livestock ponds in or near each pasture or grazing unit to avoid making livestock travel long distances.

Check for buried pipelines or cables that could be broken or punctured by excavating equipment. Avoid sites under power lines; the wire might come within reach of animals.

Preliminary site studies also should consider the adequacy of the drainage area and its protection from silt and soil erosion; minimum pond depth, amount of silt runoff and adequacy of the pond size for its intended use.

The prospective pond builder is urged to consult local engineers and local Soil Conservation Service employees for detailed information on engineering and erosion control aspects of dam and pond building.

Plans and specifications have been built in Nicholas County by land owners for livestock water and

other purposes. (See an example on Page 3.)

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Bible Week being observed by ministers

National Bible Week is being observed Nov. 21-28 and the Nicholas County Ministerial Association is sponsoring a display in the show window of the Old Variety Store on Locust Street. Among the display items are a number of posters illustrating one of the more than 1400 languages into which a portion of the Scriptures has been translated. Matthew 5:7-8 is shown in a different language on each poster with a picture of people who speak that language.

In the show window there is an assortment of 20 Scripture publications in different languages and languages are spoken. To thumb through these little booklets is to express amazement at the marvelous work of Bible Translation.

The History of the English Bible makes fascinating reading. 16-page posters trace the growth of the English Bible and give us some idea of "How Our Bible Came to Us".

In 1800 a 16-year-old Welsh girl walked 20 miles from her village home to the parsonage of the Rev. Thomas Charles of Haly, Wales, to secure a copy of the Bible which she could call her own. After a long journey, she was told that no Bible could be spared. Her disappointment was so appalling that the clergyman finally gave her a copy from his own limited supply.

The story of Mary Jones' eagerness to have a Bible, illustrating the prevailing scarcity of the Bible, is said to have been responsible for the institution of the British and Foreign Bible Society in London in 1804. A similar love for the Bible in America and a corresponding lack led to the organization in 1816, in New York City, of the American Bible Society which has made this exhibit possible.

Q--What, in your opinion, is the most pressing need for Carlisle and Nicholas County? A--Our law officers need to enforce laws more strictly, need more jobs for young people, recreational development, male employment, housing, more industry for male employment.

Q--Highest grade completed? A--8th grade, 5.2%; high school graduate, 45.2%; college graduate, 8.4%; some high school, 4.4%; some college, 24.2%; post graduate, 8.4%; no answer, 1.2%.

Q--Number in family? A--3.4 average.
