ASC election boundaries set

Harvey Wagoner, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, today designated the boundaries of each community within the county where elections of ASC community committees will be held on Oct. 1, 1971. The elections will be by mail.

Mr. Wagoner points out that the county is now comprised of four communities, whereas in the past there were five. These are identified as:

COMMUNITY A—Headquarters and Barretville.

COMMUNITY B—Ellisville and Myers.

COMMUNITY C—Moorefield and East Union.

COMMUNITY D—Carlisle and Parks.

Boundaries of the various communities where elections will be held are: Community A—Bounded by Bourbon, Harrison and Robertson Counties; U.S. 68 to junction of Hartsville Road; eastward to Scrub Grass Road by Community C, southward to Concord Church; to Somerset Bridge and Hinkson Creek.

Community B—Bounded by Community A on roads, Mt. Moriah, Bald Hill and Sugar Creek by Fleming County; Cassidy Creek Road to Myers to Scrubgrass Road across Highway 32, to Lehman Road to U.S. 68, Community C—Bounded by Community B, along Cassidy Creek Road and to Licking River, by Bath

County to Hinkson Creek to Somerset Bridge and straight line to Concord Church to Cassidy Road, Community D—Bounded by U.S. 68, northward to Mt. Moriah Road by Community B, eastward to Scrub Grass Road by Community C, southward to Concord Church; to Somerset Bridge and Hinkson Creek.

Wagoner reminded farmers that the election will choose three representatives and two alternates for each community. The chairman, vice chairman and third-ranking member of the elected ASC committee will also serve as delegates to the County convention to be held thereafter, where farmers will be elected to fill vacancies on the ASC county committee. The alternate committees will serve, as alternate delegates to the convention.

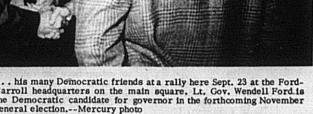
