Nicholas Growers Reminded Of Substitution Programs

Pointing out that 1972 crop barley is now being seeded in Nicholas County, local farm program official Harvey Wagner reminded growers that barley is included in the 1972 Feed Grain Program.

Eligible growers who plan to participate in the 1972 Feed Grain Program should take note that an acreage set-aside will be required of between 20 and 35 percent of a farm's barley base as well as of the corn and grain sorghum base.

The reminder that barley will be included in the 1972 Feed Grain Program is also important because the substitution provision, he said.

Substitution permits a program participant to choose a crop best suited to his farm and market operations and still earn payments for that crop.

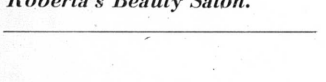
