CONGRESS VOTES

For week ending Thursday, Oct. 21, 1971.

Seat Vacant, 6th Congressional district Kentucky.

Whether to suspend the rules and pass H.R. 9212 amending the Federal Coal Mine Health and Safety Act of 1969. It respects Black Lung benefits. (Under suspension of the rules, it requires an affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of those voting.) Yeas 227, Nays 124. Rejected, Oct. 18.

Whether to suspend the rules and pass H.R. RES. 923 ordering the use of funds to carry out the National School Lunch Act and assure needy children of lunch at school. Yeas 353, Nays 0. Passed, Oct. 18.

Whether to suspend the rules and pass H.R. 10458 expanding authority to cooperate with certain countries in the control of animal diseases. Yeas 342, Nays 0. Passed, Oct. 18.

Whether to suspend the rules and pass H.R. RES. 8160 and S. RES. 335, Nays 1. Passed, Oct. 18.

Whether to open the previous question (end debate) on the Ardena Morton. It instructs House conferees to disagree with certain portions of the Senate amendment to fiscal 1972. The Senate amendments included the Mansfield Amendment fixing a date for U.S. withdrawal from Indochina. (If the motion to end debate were defeated, supporters of the Mansfield Amendment could offer a motion to instruct House conferees to agree to the amendment.) Yeas 215, Nays 195. Present 2. Previous question ordered (debate ended), Oct. 19.

Whether to agree to the President's Motion (Rejection of the motion would leave the conferees unrestricted.) Yeas 192, Nays 215. Present 2. Rejected, Oct. 19.

Whether to agree to the conference report on H.R. 9844. It authorizes \$2 billion for military construction in the current fiscal year. Yeas 370, Nays 26. Conference report agreed to, Oct. 20.

H.R. 10367 provides for action on the Land Claims of Alaska natives over a combination grant of land (40 million acres) and money (\$925 million). During debate there was one recriminator vote.

Whether to adopt the Taylor-Udall case it helps me in reaching my goal for the future. It makes me work harder to attain my career. Whether to suspend the rules and pass H.R. RES. 897 which provides nonvoting delegates to the House of Representatives for Guam and the Virgin Islands. Yeas 280, Nays 62. Question ordered, Oct. 20.

H.R. RES. 8787 was then agreed to by a nonrecriminator vote.

A procedural Note... from time to time the House resolves itself into the Committee of the Whole House in order to operate under parliamentary rules. While in committee, members of the majority of a motion by voting "Aye"; Disapproval, "No".

Probationary Licenses Asked For Young Drivers

State Driver Licensing Director Roger Wilhoite announced legislation will be sought to permit probationary licenses for new young drivers.

During the probationary period, a young driver could have his driving privileges suspended more easily than the holder of a regular license.

Wilhoite told a Governor's High School Traffic Safety Conference in Louisville that such licenses already are being issued in about a dozen states.

He said the probationary license is aimed at identifying the probationary driver more quickly than the Amendment which provides for Federal-State Land-Use Planning for existing federal lands in Alaska. Yeas 217, Nays 217. Amendment rejected, Oct. 20.

Whether to pass H.R. 10367, Yeas 334, Nays 63. Passed, Oct. 20.

Whether to pass the Armed Forces Survivor Benefit Plan (H.R. 10670). Yeas 372, Nays 0. Present 1. Passed, Oct. 21.
