This kidney transplant has enabled him to lead a normal life again by solving his kidney problem.

Mr. Crimmins was born in Lexington, Ky. He is 44 years old and has been in poor health since his childhood. He has had several kidney transplants but none have lasted more than a few months. He has a history of kidney stones, kidney infection, and kidney failure.

In his efforts to help others with kidney disease return to normal life, Crimmins is one of the few men in the world who has undergone a kidney transplant. He has a history of kidney stones, kidney infection, and kidney failure.

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By mid-summer his condition was worse and he was advised to go to Mayo Clinic for further diagnosis and treatment. After ten days at Mayo, it was determined that Crimmins had only 6% of normal kidney function.

Doctors placed him on a low-sodium, low-protein diet. According to Crimmins, he began the diet on a Friday and had lost 15 pounds of fluid by Monday morning.

"For a while the diet seemed to be providing assistance," Crimmins says his blood pressure "dropped dramatically" and he was able to pursue his work and engage in sports and travel. The doctors gave no warning of any anticipated complications.

The doctors at Mayo referred Crimmins to the University of Medical Center for further care.

In Crimmins words, "Mayo said I had more experience in transplants than they had and it would be advantageous to be in the care of someone here."

In December of 1969, Crimmins was in Austin, Texas when uremic poisoning occurred. This resulted from an accumulation of waste materials in the blood. He later discovered this poisoning was uremic. It was the uremic poisoning which he had with his special diet.

At this time, the search began for a kidney match. The first and prime source is the patient's family, especially his parents, brothers and sisters. Since there is a 90% chance of a success if there is a good match. Unfortunately, every member of Crimmins' family was contacted, but a kidney could not be found. Crimmins said his name was then added to the waiting list for a cadaver kidney. These kidneys come from people who have died from something which does not involve the kidneys.
