Memories are made up of many things. Some happy—some sad. There are memories of experiences, like that of seeing a breathtaking view, a gorgeous sunset, or a magnificent, old tree draped with its foliage with branches lifted to the sky.

To use a happy memory is running in the house to the smell of something delicious cooking. But most of all is the pungent aroma of spices. I remember the first time I ever made chili. One of my friends asked, "Why do you eat when you're making chili?" My first reason was "I didn't know the pleasure of coming into the house permeated with that delightful 'smell'." And too, I'm sure some friends had been very generous with tomatoes, etc.

Anytime I've always liked to cook from the time my Mother used to give me bits of dough and a thumb to make tiny biscuits or cookies. I think back, but I'm sure I was probably used more for that than for seeing because I can't remember ever seeing her new attire. Now back to cooking. This week will be naturally, chili sauce, tomato and spicy pickles.

CHILI SAUCE

- 1 large tomato, chopped
 - 1 large onion, chopped
 - 1 red pepper, seeded and chopped
 - 2 green peppers, seeded and chopped
 - 2/3 cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons salt
 - 1/2 cup vinegar
 - 1 teaspoon ground cloves
 - 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- Combine ingredients in a crock slowly until thick. Pour into clean jars and seal at once.

Put the carrots, apples, lemons and onion through coarsest blade of food chopper. Add other ingredients and cook all together over low heat until thick. This is good and can be made anytime of the year. Good with a curry dish and a delicious accompaniment to most any meat.

CONSERVES

PEACH CHUTNEY

- Peel 4 quarts peaches, remove pits and cut in large pieces; add 1 1/2 cups white mustard seed, 1/2 cup finely chopped onion, 2 cups sugar, 1/4 pound seedless raisins, 1/2 cup seedless or seeded raisins and 2 cups sugar. When thick add 1/4 cup coarsely chopped lemon rind and 3 tablespoons lemon juice. Mix well and cook slowly until thickened. Pour into clean jars and seal at once.

DAMSON PLUM CONSERVE

- 2 pounds plums, pitted and chopped
- 1 orange, chopped
- 2 cups water
- 1/2 cup seedless or seeded raisins and 2 cups sugar. When thick add 1/4 cup coarsely chopped lemon rind and 3 tablespoons lemon juice. Mix well and cook slowly until thickened. Pour into clean jars and seal at once.

CARROT CHUTNEY

- 4 medium carrots
- 4 apples
- 1 lemon
- 2 cups ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 2 cups vinegar
- 1/2 cup sugar
