### Hounds show is Saturday

The Licking River Hounds of Carlisle, will hold the 9th annual Horse Show, Saturday, Sept. 18, starting at 6:00 p.m., on Far Cry Farm, the home of the Licking River Hunt.

The show is held in a small oval over many fences simulating those that might be found out in the hunting country. Pines to the horse show, a "Hunt Breakfast" is held in the log cabin overlooking the jumper course, for all exhibitors, their guests and the farmers in the hunting country.

The Licking River Hounds is a registered pack of hounds which hunt live fox in the old tradition. The pack consists of 12 couples of American Foxhounds developed from breeding stock from Mrs. A.C. Randolph's Piedmont Hounds in Lippertville, Va. Many of the

followers of the hunt are farmers themselves and recognize and appreciate the service the farmers in Nicholas County contribute to their enjoyment of riding a good horse hound. Many of the farmers enjoy hearing the music of the chase as they pass over their land. Traditionally, farmers in the country are invited to join in the hunt, either on foot or on horseback.

### Jackets almost get lead

The boys knew it. The fans knew it. The coaches knew it. Nicholas County knew it had to make one touchdown in the last three minutes to get the jump on Morgan County's 14-12 lead last Friday night. However, those three minutes ticked off too quickly for Nicholas to move the ball 75 yards for the score.

In the first quarter Nicholas County scored two touchdowns before the half was finally put on the field. Devin, with 6-45 left, and Nicholas County in possession of the ball, quarterback Dennis Berry had a pass picked off by a Blue Devils back. Fumble efforts in stopping Morgan's ball carrier led to an 8-0 lead for Morgan.

Barely two minutes later after the jackets had turned the ball over to the Blue Devils through a fumble by a Blue Devils player, Nicholas scored a touchdown for 6 points. Yet Nicholas County had the last word in the first quarter by moving the ball 35 yards to set up for the final play, Darrell Snapp executed

the score by running the final 35 yards amid a flurry of tackles, pulling the score to a 14-6 Morgan lead.

The second quarter showed less action as both teams fumbled and shuttled the ball back and forth. Two penalties in the third quarter kept Nicholas County from scoring again. The jackets pushed within ten yards of pay dirt but lost out from the penalties. Morgan County took advantage of the momentum and intercepted Berry's pass. The quarter ended with Morgan making a first down on their own 45 yard line.

After the Devils losing possession of the ball on downs, Berry called around the left end for the second touchdown in bringing the score to a 14-12 margin of victory over Morgan County. A suspension filled three minutes to gain a lead over Morgan was fruitless. However, the 2 point loss for the jackets compares unfavorably with last season's 44-0 deficit at the hands of the Devils.

The team will meet Connor tomorrow night at home before the season's first road trip.

The Nicholas County Board of Education passed a motion Sept. 4 that any person or persons desiring to appear before it must notify the chairman in writing 10 days before a regular meeting.

## Emberton, Harper and others see voters

Tom Emberton brought his people-to-people campaign to Nicholas County on Friday and talked to the voters about building a better Kentucky in the next four years.

Emberton, the nominee for Governor in the November General Election, said "tax relief for the people of Kentucky is the biggest issue in the current campaign".

Emberton, who is traveling to every Kentucky county in a CARE-o-van, was accompanied here by Ken Harper, candidate for Secretary of State, Bob Miller, candidate for State Auditor and Doug Moseley, candidate for Clerk of the Court of Appeals.

The gubernatorial nominee said other major goals of his administration would be the creation of "more and better jobs" for the people of Kentucky, major emphasis on rural and secondary roads,

protecting the state's environment, and building a better life for older Kentuckians.

Emberton's CARE-o-van schedule begins before 6 o'clock in the morning and runs until late at night and in the course of a typical day he shakes hundreds of hands and tells voters "I appreciate your help."

Since mid-August Emberton has averaged visiting more than four counties a day.

"We are taking our campaign to the people," he says. "We are taking it to all of the people. We want it to be known that we are
