Another way to stop mold growth in leather goods is to scatter a mixture of fine sandblasted in their, then place in a plastic bag or other airtight container. The vapors will kill mold that have grown into the leather but they'll give you protection against future contamination. As the vapors break out, you'll need to add more crystals. Before using, air the leather goods thoroughly. Do not use paradichlorobenzene in luggage because it can cause mildew always present in the air, but they need dampness and warm temperature to grow. During muggy weather, they flourish in boxes that are closed or poorly ventilated. They feed on cotton, linen, rayon, silk, wool, leather, wood and paper. Many of the new man-made fibers are resistant or impervious to mildew.

If you have clothes that can be tightly closed, it's a good idea to use moisture-absorbing chemicals such as silica gel, activated alumina, or calcium chloride. Check up on them often to see if they need to be dried out again. A thick soda of saddle soap, or where the air is circulating freely, put out in the sun if you wish to kill mildew spores.

For further protection, polish the leather with a wax dressing, or with a paste floor wax. The film of wax protects leather from moisture, and mildew can't grow on the wax. You can freshen up the middle of shoes with a room deodorant spray that contains a germ killer. Mildew growth on the cloth interior of shoes and handbags can be removed with a formaldehyde solution, obtainable from your druggist. Mrs. Parker says that wearing rubber or plastic gloves to protect your hands, moisten a cotton ball with the solution and wash the surface thoroughly. Then wrap shoes tightly in a plastic bag and allow the vapors to permeate for at least an hour. If you air the shoes or handbags, air them thoroughly out-of-doors, because formaldehyde vapors can be very irritating. Avoid inhaling them or getting the solution on your skin.
