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Response poor, VEE vaccination continues

Response was not good to the first vaccination clinic held last Saturday. The last clinic scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 25, will be open from 10-12 o'clock and will be only for those who cannot have their horses ready when the veterinarian comes to their community.

Vaccination will continue on the farm for the next two weeks. Routes to be followed in order are: first, Carlisle, Route 1, and Chatterbox, Route 1, second, Carlisle, Route 2, and Mopreftold, Route 1 third, Carlisle, Route 3, and Cynthiana, Route 4 fourth, Carlisle, Route 4, and Ewing, Route 1. City horses will be vaccinated with those of the nearest rural route. It is expected to take 1 to 3 days for each area.

The membership campaign will close Saturday, Sept. 25. In addition, a quarantine of unvaccinated animals is always a possibility if this initial voluntary program is not effective. It must be emphasized that all eligible animals be reported as soon as possible to the Extension Office (phone 289-2312) or to Dr. Sull (289-5900). The cooperation of all horse owners is requested in contacting others who may not have reported their animals. The number and location of all animals to be vaccinated each day must be known in advance so enough vaccine can be obtained to do the job. All those who have reported their animals will be notified of the day on which vaccinations will be done in their area. All animals should be put up and ready to be vaccinated when the veterinarian arrives so he can stay on schedule. It would also help if groups of neighbors could arrange to have their animals at a central location to cut down on the number of individual stops required. If this is done a more definite time schedule can be arranged. There must be someone present to represent the owner and furnish information for the vaccination certificate.

It is hoped that all eligible animals will be vaccinated before the end of this month.

Attention will be by season membership only and no tickets will be sold for any individual programs. Memberships may be obtained by mail from the executive secretary, Mrs. Burton Millward, 440 Andover Drive, Lexington, Ky. 40502. The fee is \$10 for the season, and \$5 for children under 14 years of age. Children under five will not be admitted. Orders should be accompanied by checks payable to the Central Kentucky Concert Assn., or by Bank Americard charge number.
