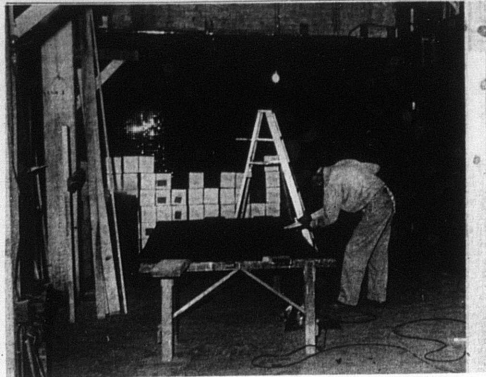

Alfred J. Richardson, Soil Scientist with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service is now working a Progressive Soil Survey for Bourbon and Nicholas Counties. He is presently doing some block mapping in the Carlisle vicinity. Mr. Richardson will be stopping by the homes to ask permission to go on the farm. If no one is home he will go ahead and map the farm. The Soil Survey will be used for various purposes and by various people. The farm of landowner will be able to get a copy of the map of their land. In the past years the Soil Scientist mapped individual farms upon request by the landowner. This method will still be used along with the block mapping.
