(Are you looking for different ways to serve the same old stand-by "vegetables"? Or something to add zest to an otherwise mundane meal. If you are tired of potatoes served in the same old way try this.)

POTATO CHEESE CASSEROLE

6 medium potatoes
1/4 cup butter, melted
1/2 teaspoon regular or seasoned salt
1 cup grated Swiss cheese
2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese
Butter a square glass 2 quart baking dish (about 9 by 8 by 2 inches, something not too deep). Peel potatoes and slice in thin slices. Arrange overlapping slices in rows, in buttered dish. Make sure top is flat—if edges of potato slices stick up they may get too brown.
Four melted butter over potatoes and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake in hot oven until potatoes are tender when tested with fork. Top and bottom layers should be slightly crisp.
Remove from oven and sprinkle with Swiss and Parmesan cheese. Return to oven and cook until cheese is melted.
To serve cut in squares and lift out with wide server. This should serve six. Adjust recipe to suit your taste. Use one way or either to add or to cut ingredients.

1 or 2 ribs celery, diced
1 clove garlic, minced
2 cups sliced cooked ham
2 cups whole canned tomatoes, cup up
dash of hot pepper sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cook rice and set aside. Cook onion, celery, and garlic in about 2 tablespoons of margarine until tender. Add tomatoes, ham, pepper sauce and salt. Let cook slowly about 1/2 hour. If mixture becomes too dry add juice from canned tomatoes as needed. When done mix into rice and let stand awhile before serving as flavors will permeate. Keep warm.

If you want to do something different with rice try this:

CAJUN RICE

1 1/2 cups hot cooked rice
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1/2 cup minced celery
1/2 cup minced green pepper
1/2 sliced crisp bacon, crumbled
3 hard cooked eggs, chopped
1/2 cup sliced green onion tops
1 can mushrooms
1/2 cup bacon until crisp, then drain. Remove most of bacon fat, then saute onion, green pepper, celery, 3 drained mushrooms and pimento until wilted.
Combine all ingredients and toss lightly. Place in casserole and bake in oven at 450 degrees for approximately 10 minutes or until hot.
Believe it or not this is also used as a salad in Cajun country, and I am told it is delicious.
To use as a salad combine all ingredients, add cold and a little more mayonnaise just before serving, and toss lightly.

Do this will have perhaps, some of that Easter ham left? Why not try this different dish?

Senator Cook advised dams no threat
Senator Marlow Cook said in Washington Thursday that he has been advised by F.P. Oulson, Director of the U.S. Bureau of Mines, that coal mine waste dams in Kentucky do not present any threats like the Buffalo Creek West Virginia disaster which caused disastrous flooding recently.
Reacting to press announcements from a similar occurrence, when Senator contacted the Department of the Interior on the day of the washout and asked them to undertake a survey in the state, the Department felt there was only a potential danger in the Haymond area of Letcher County. An inspection of the area was ordered. The inspection undertaken by the Bureau of Mines, however, stated, "Three waste banks in the area of the Haymond area, impounded water and only one contained a drain pipe. The other two were formed by the bank from the pool of area upstream. No immediate danger of a sudden release of the water could be foreseen."
Another report concluded with, "Another bank on the north fork of the Kentucky River, about three miles upstream from Kona, Ky., was examined and contained a small quantity of water, but the investigator was informed that this pond was to be drained."
