Kroger redesigns bacon package

The consumer's "right to know" received another boost today as the Kroger Co., Cincinnati, announced new bacon packaging designed to let shoppers see at a glance how much lean there is in the bacon.

James P. Herring, Kroger president, today announced that the firm's bacon packaging has been redesigned to uncover two-thirds of the front of the package in addition to a "window" in the back. The 1-3/4 by 8-1/4 inch window exposes a strip of bacon so shoppers can further judge for themselves whether the leanness suits their preferences.

Bacon packaging has been in the news in recent weeks as Virginia Krauer, President Moon's special assistant for consumer affairs, urged bacon packagers to "develop a package which will satisfy consumer requests for a better look at packaged bacon."

The new bacon package went on sale this week in 21 Kroger supermarkets in Kansas City and St. Louis, Mo., Indianapolis and Ft. Wayne, Ind., and Peoria, Ill. By the end of the year, plans call for it to be in all of the 140 Kroger supermarkets.

Packaging machinery at plants must be revamped for the new package, and as each switch-over is completed, stores served by that plant will receive it. Kroger has been working on development of the new package for some time.

Jack Crowner, farm director for WAVE radio and television, Louisville, had been named June Dairy Month Chairman for the State of Kentucky for 1972. An announcement of his selection was made by Harmon H. Barlow Jr., Route 2, Cave City, president of American Dairy Association of Kentucky.

As June Dairy Month Chairman, Crowner will direct the month-long special events of approximately 25,000 dairy farmers of Kentucky. These activities range from milking contests to parades, athletic events, and county dairy princess contests in all sections of the State.
