



City tax rate up 1 1/2¢ per \$100 due to Homestead exemptions

City Council set 24 cents per \$100 assessed valuation as the new tax rate at its regular meeting on Monday night. Flipping of this amount are 110 homestead exemptions of \$6500 each, and over \$840,000 growth. Last year's rate was 22.5 cents.

Attorney Billy Hopkins, representing a group of residents who are interested in organizing a Sanitation District, appeared before Council requesting that the City write a Letter of Intent in support of the District. The District would provide sewer facilities to residents of Baker Acres, Arnold Heights, Liberty Heights and Shepherd Hills. The City agreed to write the Letter of Intent which will state that the City will let the District look on to its sewer system.

Climer Hamper stated that he had installed curbs and gutters on Sharon Way now to be called Cardinal Lane. He requested that the City blacktop the street as it had agreed to do earlier. An unanimous vote of Councilmen (5-0, Don Smith absent) will permit the street to be blacktopped as requested.

By 4-0 vote, with Clifton Waugh not voting, Council decided to keep the City out of a pipe line situation of Funsell Alexander's and to require Alexander to meet the code requirements on the line if it is to be annexed at a later date. Alexander had wanted a letter from the City saying that the City would repair the line, and a contract, separately, saying that Alexander would pay for the repairs. It was agreed by Council that the City had no authority to do work outside the City limits.

By a 5-0 vote, Council agreed to put each apartment in the new Housing Project on Sycamore Hill on separate meters. The motion also included a \$25 sewer tapping amount as is done for each individual home.

The City voted to advertise for bids for the purchase of a new

police cruiser. Waugh voted against the motion.

Dr. Allen Hamon requested a parking space be marked off at his office so that he can move his cars more easily in an emergency. Council granted this request by 4-1 vote.

A yellow line will be installed on the east side of Broadway from the old hotel to the corner. The meters from this location will be moved to empty space on Locust Street.

Drafting permits passed for the following Frank Lyman, widen driveway and install truck well to hold bank, Kickland Building, repair inside and new front; Robert I. Fisher, sidewalk, Main and Broadway; Bill Henderson on Spring Street, five concrete steps from walk to street; L.H. Fryman, Second Street, 60 feet curb and guttering.

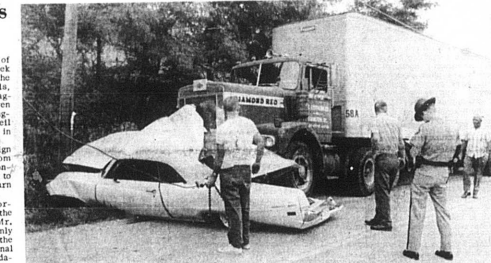

Registration will be from 9 to 9:45 a.m., and the meeting will begin at 10 a.m.

The alternatives which will be presented at the meeting include the following: 1—The approved plan with variations; 2—Falmouth Level; 3—Licking River Channel Improvement; 4—Contingency Level; 5—Newport Wilder Level; 6—Three Reservoir Systems tributaries.

Wendell Ford, senators and representatives of Kentucky, State Agencies, judges from the affected counties and the Sierra Club, National Audubon Society, League of Women Voters of Kentucky, The Garden Club of Kentucky, Environmental Law Society, Environmental Defense Fund and the Licking Valley Protective Association have been contacted and urged to attend this meeting.

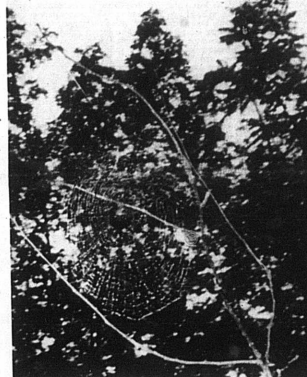
Neil Thompson Cystic Fibrosis chairman

Sc. Kendall was declared the winner when he shot 336 against Meredith's 334. A total of 359 competitors competed for the title.
