Recently while in New Carlsbad, Calif., visiting my son, Toby Elder and his wife, Ann, I met a most charming and interesting couple from Holland, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Vanvelhoven. Our first meeting was when Toby and Ann entertained

parfait glass, drizzled 1-tablespoon Sherry over that; whipped the cream and commercial topping and combined them; added a layer of this and so until glass is filled, ending with whipped cream and the cherry. The ones we made were delicious even though they had only a few hours to marinate. They would have been better if they could have been made the night before.

Different guests have showered me with suggestions. Some you probably know, but I shall pass them on for those who may not. The next half hour was spent copying the material and the melon will select at least two melons. Serve either in wedges or cut in serving plates.

Waterfowl hunting regulations remain virtually unchanged

Kentucky waterfowl hunting regulations for 1972-73 remain virtually unchanged from those of last season as far as limits and length of season are concerned. The Wildlife Resources Commission in Frankfort, Ky., announced today that the duck season will open Dec. 2 and continue through Jan. 20, both statewide and at the Ballard County Wildlife Management area, and the goose season will extend from Nov. 12 through Jan. 20, statewide, and from Dec. 1 through Jan. 20 at the Ballard area. Daily bag limit for ducks will again be four and may include no more than two wood ducks and possession limit of eight may contain no more than four wood ducks. No canvasback or redhead ducks may be harvested this season, Mitchell said.

A bonus for Kentucky hunters will be an extra blue-winged teal limit of two daily or four in possession during the first nine days of the regular duck season (Dec. 2-10) and an extra limit during the entire season of two scamp daily for five in possession. The bonus limits are in addition to the regular bag and possession limits. The bonus limits also remain unchanged from last season. Five daily limit may include no more than two Canada geese or two white-fronted and the possession limit no more than four Canada and white-fronted in aggregate, of which not more than two may be white-fronted.

Always let pastry kept in refrigerator come to room temperature before using. Add 2 tablespoons lemon juice to 1/2 cup bottled bottled red head, crab, asparagus or French beans. Four medium butter over top.

When green peppers are cheap, freeze whole in plastic bags for winter use. They are good for cooking but not if you want a crisp pepper. They will be limp when thawed. This does not hurt the flavor, so use only in cooking.
