PRIGS AND POLITICS
With the opening of colleges and universities in the fall, Ralph Nader's counter-conglomerate undoubtedly will be making a big push to establish so-called PRIGs (Public Interest Research Groups) on campuses. These campus organizations are heavily dependent on the support of the general public. The PRIG concept of coercive funding and involuntary membership. And, certainly, colleges and universities shouldn't allow themselves to serve as collection agents for politicized groups. It is good news that some students concerned about PRIG groups are prepared to file suits against institutions which collect mandatory student fees for the Nader organizations.

Students attracted by the PRIG concept also would do well to consider the huge expansion of Mr. Nader's activities. Casper Weinberger, former chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, recently stipulated the charges in the Nader set-up, saying, "I get the impression of a person who is franchising himself, who doesn't have control over the quality, but like anything else—the franchise in Chicago may not be the same as the old master."

It is heartening to find these concerned students opposed to the PRIG groups is coming from students as well as faculty. Student members of the Committee Against Student Exploitation recently issued a critical report on WashPRIG. The students wrote: "WashPRIG is just an idea now, an idea formulated by Ralph Nader, but it is trying desperately to become a reality. Nader views WashPRIG as the mechanism which can redress the Left's movement of the 1960's from the issues of the Vietnam War to the issues of environmental protection, consumer protection, and the role of the corporation and government agencies in the lives of the average citizen."

The student committee in Washington objects to "the philosophy that WashPRIG uses to justify involuntary funding and involuntary membership." They point out, moreover, that "WashPRIG is a highly political organization. One of the Wash PRIG's most important functions will be to lobby in support of or against various legislative acts. Clearly, as soon as a group enters the legislative halls to influence legislation it has entered the political thicket."

Fish, Wildlife appointments

Three appointments to the nine-member Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Commission were made today by Governor Wendell Ford.

The three new commission members were appointed to fill vacancies created by expired terms in First, Fifth and Sixth Wildlife Districts. Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources Commissioner Arnold Mitchell said.

Dr. Donald L. Boucher, Paducah, First District; Dr. E.L. Lanier, Union, Fifth District; and Charles E. Palmer Jr., Lexington, Sixth District.

The three men were chosen by the Governor from lists of five candidates selected by appointment in each of the three districts.

Dr. Boucher, a surgeon, succeeds Cecil Shannon of Hopkinsville. Dr. Lanier, a psychiatrist, replaces Willy Ribiceman, Ft. Mitchell. Lanier, former attorney, succeeds John Congleton of Richmond.

The appointments will be sworn in for four-year terms at a quarterly meeting of the commission Friday, Aug. 18, in the Fish and Wildlife Department offices in Frankfort. Commissioner Mitchell said.
