Newspapers award 10 scholarships

The newspapers of Kentucky this week awarded 10 scholarships to Journalism students in three Kentucky colleges. The awards were made possible through the Journalism Foundation, established in 1958 with contributions from newspapers over the state.

The grants for the fall semester were made to seven 1972 high school graduates, two second year students who received the KPA scholarship last year, and to a Vietnam veteran for his final year of study.

Receiving the awards were: Scott Williamson, Corbin County Parish, Valley Station, and Delma J. Francis, Lancaster, enrolled at Eastern Kentucky University.

KU asks for rehearing on electric rate increase

Kentucky Utilities Company has asked the Public Service Commission of Kentucky for a rehearing in its application for rate increases. The PSC on Aug. 2 ordered new electric rates designed to produce additional annual revenue for KU of \$3,790,915 instead of the \$13,778,000 the company sought.

KU's petition, filed with the PSC Monday, sets out four grounds for rehearing:
1) Failure of the commission to adjust for the effect of the 1972 change in the Kentucky corporate income tax.
2) The commission's treatment of "interest during construction"

GRANT PROVIDES Circuit courtroom modernization

Nicholas county has received a \$1,050 grant to fund necessary circuit courtroom facilities. Gov. Wendell Ford has announced.

The Governor said the award would be used to provide reliable sound and recording equipment for circuit courtrooms where felony cases are tried. The equipment will facilitate the hearing of cases and improve the accuracy and completeness of court records.

The grants will be used primarily to purchase recorders, microphones, speakers and transcribing units and magnetic tape cassettes for the individual courtrooms.

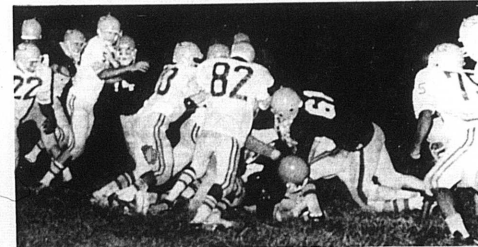
Morehead U Ag Club horse show

Georgetown defeats Nicholas county Blue Jackets 21-6

Nicholas County High School's fabled two game win streak was brought to a quick end Friday night as the Georgetown Buffalos simply out-ran and out-defended the smaller, less experienced Bluejackets, 21-6. The four big factors behind Georgetown's two touchdown victory was Danny Dunn, Ruby McEvere, Duane Jackson, and Bobby Cook, who in their spare time also make up Georgetown's Class A State Champion 850 yard relay team. The smooth handling of veteran quarterback Dunn, plus the explosive running of McEvere, the blocking proved just too much for the Bluejackets to handle.

Nicholas County, his hard by graduation almost the entire line and star running back Roger McEvere, turned out to be the first respectable performance considering the circumstances. The Bluejackets defense, which was somewhat less than spectacular last year, did a fairly steady job for several new faces doing well in key situations. Kurt Kelly, Dennis Berry and Sidney Anderson turned out their usual fine defensive efforts and the Georgetown Buffalos did a commendable job of keeping the speedy Georgetown backs from getting outside on the wide running plays and from going long in the air. In the first quarter, Nicholas County came out running its simpler stuff with most plays running to the middle and off-tackle. Dennis Berry was the workhorse of the backfield, carrying the ball over 20 times during the game. The smooth handling of the effective blocking, plus the fact that the entire Georgetown team seemed to know where every play was going, the Jackeroffense never got off the ground in the first quarter. Georgetown's only offensive threats were shut off when Sid Anderson, Jarrod loose a fumble which Roy Fryman recovered on the Jacker's 35 yard line. Dennis Berry saved a touchdown when he picked off a Georgetown pass deep in his own territory, and with the help of a surprising wall of blockers, returned the ball 15 yards. Early in the second quarter Georgetown was knocking at the door again behind the slick ball handling and passing of Danny Dunn. The Buffalos were going strong and got an air the Jacker 20 yard line before three key defense plays by Kurt Kelly, Anderson and Darrell Snapp halted the drive. Nicholas County was held in check the next series of downs, and was forced to punt. Punter Sidney Anderson, who had been having his problems getting off good kicks with the slippery ball, got off a boomer this time. Unfortunately, Ruby McEvere unblocked a spectacular 40 yard return up the sideline near Georgetown had drawn first blood.
