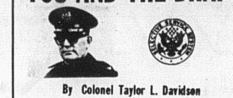
JOHN J. DEATLEY

who are covered by other types of insurance, will not participate either.
The \$7,000 that is going to Nicholas County will be divided by some 100 local veterans. It will not be necessary for them to apply for the money. It is noted. It will be distributed automatically.
The average check to the nation's World War I veterans will be \$135 and, to the World War II, war 808. In individual cases, the payments will be above or below these figures, depending with the amount of insurance held and other factors.
The VA explains that the dividends were made possible by an increase in the amount of interest earned by the two life insurance trust funds. In addition, the mortality rate among the veterans has been lower than originally anticipated.
Many ex-service men will gain in other directions, beginning in February, some 2,300,000 disabled vets and the families of deceased veterans will be getting an additional \$195,000,000 in pension benefits on an annual basis.

YOU AND THE DRAFT

FRANKFORT—All young men born in 1953 will in the next few weeks receive a communication from their "draft" board informing them of their "lottery" number.
The fourth annual "draft lottery" was held Feb. 2, and unless deferred or exempt, these young men will face their year of prime exposure to the "draft" during the summer months.
Possible induction in 1973 deservy to know their relative chance of induction as soon as possible so they may be better able to plan ahead. In lay language, this means that in the game of "high-low" those young men holding a high number may not face involuntary military service in 1973, provided the present trends of reducing the size of the armed forces and increased voluntary enlistments continue.
A registrant with a deferment is not subject to call while deferred. However, when his deferment expires, if he is placed in Class I-A or I-A-D, he will be subject to induction, depending on his number with the group then being called.
For example, if he is a registrant whose deferment expires in 1972, he would be subject to call in 1972 if his initially assigned number is reached. If his number is reached by his local board in 1972 prior to the expiration of his deferment, he could expect to be selected shortly after being placed in a class available for service (I-A).
If his number is not reached by his local board prior to the expiration of his deferment, he would be selected when and if his number is reached. A registrant whose number is not reached during the calendar year in which he is available will be placed in a lower priority selection group.
At the present time, we do not know when the next "draft" call will be announced. A registrant must be given a minimum of 30 days written notice prior to reporting for induction.

years of age by Jan. 1, 1972, must own his home and occupy it as his personal residence.
For purposes of the exemption, a "homestead" is defined as a single family dwelling with land in a residence which otherwise the exemption will not apply to acreage used for agricultural purposes.
A single-unit residence is defined as "a private residence which an individual or family lives." Ross noted, This does not include an apartment or duplex but does include a condominium unit owned and occupied on an individual basis.
When a homestead is jointly owned by more than one person, the exemption applies only when all owners are 65 or older and the homestead is maintained as a residence of all of the owners. However, if jointly owned by husband and wife only one must be 65 to qualify.
The renting of a room or rooms in a residence which otherwise qualifies, does not render the residence ineligible for exemption.
A mobile home may qualify as a single-unit residence provided the mobile parts have been removed and the unit rests on a permanent, fixed foundation.
Only one exemption per homestead will be allowed. When an eligible owner qualifying for the exemption owns more than one property, he is entitled to the exemption only on that property which is his principal residence.
