The Rev. Herman B. Darrick, Bishop of Nashville and Carroll T. Dozier, Bishop of Memphis. The theme of the meeting was "Priesthood-Manpower". Key-

note speaker was the Rev. Frank Bonnke, president of the National Federation of Priest Councils. He spoke on the "Reflections on the Roman Synod regarding priesthood, present and future, in this country". The workshop speaker was the Rev. Hilary Otieno, O.S.B., Director of the St. Meinrad Seminary, who spoke on "The role of the priestly ministry in relation to future multiple ministry".

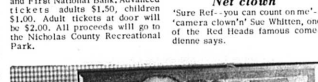

Holy Land Tour

The members of the Carlisle Baptist Church presented their pastor and wife with a trip to the Holy Land as a Christmas gift. Edgar Allen Darrell, on behalf of the church, presented a certificate "good for a trip to the Holy Land for two" to the pastor and his wife.

Rev. and Mrs. H. Dallas Sugg joined others in New York for a trip to the Holy Land for two on Feb. 7. They will be visiting six countries during their tour. They will fly to Nicosia, Cyprus and there board a Greek luxury liner for the remainder of the tour.

They will tour Egypt, Israel, Lebanon, Turkey and Rome. In Egypt the tour will consist of the great pyramids of Giza and the Sphinx. In Lebanon they will tour Beirut and Haifa which is the ancient city of the pagan god Baal. They will also tour the Temple of Jupiter, Bacchus, and Venus.

The tour in Turkey will be over some of the routes that the Apostle Paul traveled. Sights of interest will include the Well of Paul, Cleopatra's gate, and the Church of St. Peter in Antioch. Israel's tour will include a drive to Tiberias, a motor-launch cruise on the Sea of Galilee, the Mount of Beatitudes and other points of interest.

The tour includes two days in Jerusalem - Bethlehem viewing all of the traditional sights of interest attached to the birth, life, death and resurrection of Christ.

The trip to Rome is one that will include the usual trip to the Vatican, some of the ruins around Rome, and the modern city of Rome. They will return from Rome to New York and spend a morning and afternoon touring in New York and return to Lexington on Feb. 17.
