Tobacco sales set new averages as market closes

The small, high quality crop of Harley tobacco sold in the 1971-72 season set new records for both grade prices and general average reports the Federal-State Market News Service. Prices on opening sales for all grades were well above the record levels set the year before. A strong demand pushed grade prices higher each week with the upward trend continuing through the fifth week of auctions. During that week nearly all grades of better lugs, flyings and leaf reached their peak and were selling within the narrow range of \$85.00 to \$85.00 per hundred pounds. Gains for lower quality grades of leaf, tips and non-descript were even more spectacular. Averages for most of these offerings soared to levels \$10.00 to \$17.00 per hundred above 1970 crop prices.

Growers brought to market the smallest crop in 13 years as marketing dropped around 55 million pounds below the quota allowed under the new poundage program. Total gross sales of

Louisville—Most employers will be subject to the Federal unemployment tax beginning in 1972. Robert J. Darr, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky, said Wednesday.

Under Public Law 91-573, an employer is subject to the Federal unemployment tax if during 1971 or 1972 he paid wages of \$1,500 in a calendar quarter or had one or more employees at any time in each of 20 calendar weeks. Previously, employers were not subject to the tax unless they had four or more employees at any time in each of 20 calendar weeks.

The first \$4,000 of wages paid an employee is subject to the tax. The rate of tax is 3.2 percent, but a credit is allowed for contributions paid to a state unemployment tax.

Government loan receipts were extremely light during the first part of the season then dwindled to zero as grade prices climbed upward. Season averages were \$3.00 and \$4.00 above the support levels for better lugs and flyings while prices for many lower grades topped support levels by \$20.00 to \$27.00. The three associations operating in the belt received only 178,184 pounds or 24 percent of the season's total marketings. Last year growers placed 8.2 percent of gross sales under Government loan.

The marketing season began on Nov. 22 and auctions were held 34 sales days through Feb. 3. A clean-up sale is scheduled at Lexington on Feb. 10. Sales ended last year on Feb. 17.
