Dear Sir:

We are writing to express our opposition to those parts of House Bill 197 and any future legislation that would legalize abortion in Kentucky.

There are few civilized people who do not admit that the intentional killing of innocent human beings is morally and socially wrong. The problem is not in determining when a being becomes human and, therefore, entitled to life.

Pro-abortionists arbitrarily set the time at which a fetus becomes a human being at some point in its development at which they feel it can function as a human being. There is no rational basis for such a claim. Even if there were, it would not be practical to abort a child before it has reached or not each individual fetus to be aborted had reached such a point.

The development of a human being does not proceed in such distinct separate steps but as a continuous multiphased process beginning at the moment of conception.
