The U.S. Department of Agriculture has purchased over 3.23 million pounds of frozen ground pork and 2.78 million pounds of canned pork for donation throughout the Southeast and across the nation.

Officials of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said the frozen ground pork was bought at a cost of about \$1.09 million for distribution to schools.

The canned pork was bought at a cost of nearly \$2.04 million for use in direct food assistance programs, C&MS officials said. Funds for both purchases were provided under Section 32 of Public Law 74-320.

Transy to sponsor study abroad

Transylvania University will this summer again sponsor a unique academic-travel study program in Europe. The program, "Transylvania Summer University Abroad," will offer univer-

sity course work in the setting of major European cities under the supervision of members of the Transylvania faculty. The summer season will begin June 29 thru Aug. 1. The itinerary will include Madrid, Rome, Florence, Vienna, Paris and London. Trips to cities and sites in the vicinity of each of these major centers will be included. The Foreign Study League will provide travel and tour services.

Dr. Benjamin F. Burns, dean of Morrison Chapel and assistant professor of Humanities, will direct the summer university abroad program. Transylvania's third such program for which Dr. Burns has served as director.

In addition to Transylvania students in good standing at any university may participate in the program. Also for the first time, Transylvania will permit students who have been accepted for enrollment at the university in September to attend the summer program.

Courses for university credit will be offered in World History and in Humanities. Other course work will be designed to meet the needs of individual students or in response to enrollment. Adult privileges may be extended to those who do not desire course credit. A student must register for a total of eight quarter hours.

Deadlines for application for the summer program is March 15. Additional information may be obtained by contacting Dr. Burns at Transylvania University in Lexington.
