Subsequently it was sent to the state Police Laboratory in Frankfort for positive identification. The laboratory reported the contents to be 5.5 grams of marijuana. Steel appeared in city police court Monday afternoon, Jan. 17, where he entered a plea of guilty to the charge of possession of a dangerous drug for his own use. Police Judge Raymond Hall committed Steel to the Blue Grass West Comprehensive Care Center, Frankfort, for a program of treatment and rehabilitation not to exceed one year.

With Lyman in his one-car accident were two passengers, John Marshall and Larry Trussell, both of Carlisle. Marshall sustained internal injuries and was taken to St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lyman, North Street, and a sister, Mrs. Roger Collins, New Orleans, La.

VA reclaims \$2.2 million in silver

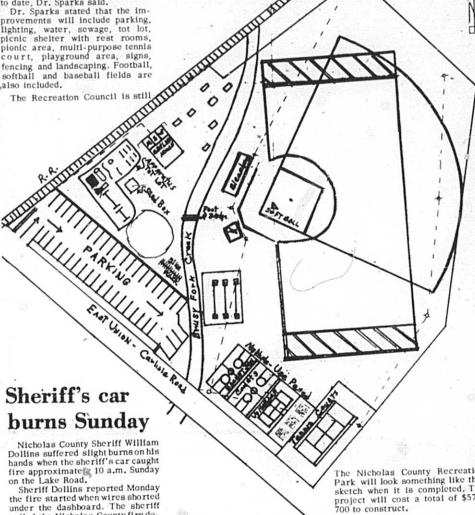
Silver worth \$2.2 million has been reclaimed from Veterans Administration x-ray film during the past three years, the agency announced today. Under a recent policy change, x-ray film is kept only five years, rather than original 10, so the silver yield increased, and addition to savings are realized from saving on storage space, too. The policy and the technique for reclaiming silver from used x-ray film was pioneered in the VA's system of 165 hospitals and 201 outpatient clinics. The program is viewed as a model for other government agencies.

6th District may be most altered by reapportionment plans

the 6th District is William P. Curlin Jr. of Frankfort, who was elected to succeed the late John Wats last month. The 6th District would lose Madison and part of Jessamine County to the 5th District and Bracken, Mason, Montgomery, Nicholas, Powell and Robertson counties to the 7th. The 7th District, now represented by Carl Perkins of Hindman, the dean of Kentucky's congressional delegation, would lose only one county, Lee, which would go to the 5th. Counties comprising the 7th District are: Bath, Fleming, Lewis, Rowan, Menifee, Wolf, Breathitt, Perry, Letcher, Knott, Magoffin, Morgan, Elliott, Carter, Greenup, Boyd, Lawrence, Johnson, Martin, Floyd and Pike. The purpose of the redistricting is to equalize the population in all districts. The only change in the present 1st and 2nd Districts under the bill would shift part of Ohio County from the 2nd to the 1st. The 3rd District would fall entirely within Jefferson. The 4th District would contain all of the counties bordering the Ohio River from Campbell to Jefferson County. Other reapportionment bills introduced were one by Rep. Arthur Schmitt, R. Cold Spring. The other new bill introduced Monday by Rep. Dwight Wells, D. Richmond would shift Central Kentucky's 6th District so drastically as earlier proposals.
