New grower tobacco allotment rules given

Harvey Wagener, chairman of the Nicholas ASC County Committee, announces the requirements to qualify for a new grower tobacco allotment. All of the following must be met:

1. Have had at least two years experience in the last five years (1967-1971) in producing, harvesting, and marketing the type of tobacco requested in the application as shag tobacco, stem, or opera-tor. (Tobacco produced on a farm that had no acreage allotment will not be considered for experience).
2. Own the farm.
3. Own, or otherwise have readily available, adequate equipment and the other facilities of production necessary to the successful production of the kind of to-

bacco requested on the farm.

4. Expect to obtain, during 1972, more than 50 percent of his income from the production of agricultural commodities or products from the farm for which the new farm allotment application is filed.
5. Own or operate no other farm for which a Turkey Tobacco allotment is established.
6. Not have been approved for a new farm allotment during the preceding three years.

Any person who can meet all of these requirements should request an application from the Nicholas County ASCS Office, if he wishes to apply for an allotment. Applications must be filed with the ASC County Committee by not later than February, 1972.

LACK OF Kidneys, transplant problem

Finding enough kidney donors for the many Kentuckians with kidney failure is the big problem now that kidney transplantation has become a proven mode of therapy.

The Nicholas County Health Department recently joined the efforts of the Kidney Foundation of Central Kentucky in a public awareness program, and today received a supply of Uniform Donor Cards for issue on request to persons wishing to authorize transplantation of their kidneys after they die.

According to Dr. Jack T. Morford, chairman, Nicholas County Board of Health, "these wallet-sized cards never become valid of course, during the life-time of the donor.

pression of the highest humanitarian ideals, and if used, can become gifts of life to persons whose kidneys can no longer perform the vital functions of cleansing the blood of body wastes."

"In addition to that," he said, "the chances of finding an excellent tissue match between unrelated persons are only about one in 1000. Therefore, in order for medical centers such as those at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville to provide kidney transplants, a large pool of donor kidneys must be maintained."

All Nicholas Countians are urged to support the program by carrying Uniform Cards in their purses or wallets, and encouraging others to do the same.
