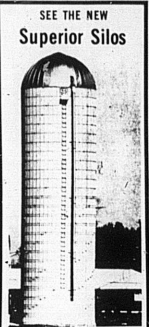

January 31 is deadline for W-2 forms

Employers must provide Forms W-2 to employees who were on their payroll Dec. 31, 1971 no later than Jan. 31, 1972 according to Robert J. Bath, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky.

Dath also reminded employers that when an employee's Form W-2 employment history for the end of a calendar year that a Form W-2 must be provided to the employee not later than 30 days after his last wages are paid.
