KSBA meet held in Lexington

The 36th Annual State Convention of the Kentucky School Boards Association was held in Lexington on Jan. 17-18. D. P. Parkey, Superintendent of Nicholas County Schools, attended some of the sessions. None of the local school board members attended the convention.

State School Supt. Dr. Lyman Cinger told the group that Gov. Wendell H. Ford's biennial budget will contain a 12 per cent salary increase for teachers.

He said salaries would be increased six per cent in each of the next two years in accordance with a policy approved earlier by Governor Ford.

Cinger said the budget also will include: Provision for vocational and special education under the Minimum Foundation Act.

Increasing the teachers' insurance policy program for \$200 to \$300 per teacher.

Funds for planning and opening a statewide kindergarten program.

REAP plea, put waste land in trees; see ASCS office

In Northeastern Kentucky there are thousands of acres of land that are unproductive. This is a waste. Much of this land is too steep for even pasture maintenance with modern machinery. However, this land does not need to remain idle. By planting trees on the land, forest products can be grown with little maintenance except protection from grazing and fire.

For most people, planting trees will require very little investment. Cost sharing under the REAP program is available. REAP will pay \$24.00 per acre (1000 trees) with the trees costing \$10.00. The remaining \$14.00 goes toward the cost of planting the trees. If site preparation the removal or denuding of present scrubby growth is needed, the cost-share rate is 80 percent of the cost of material and labor, not to exceed \$18.00 payment per acre. In case fencing is needed to protect the trees there is an 80 percent payment for materials and labor.

In order to receive cost-sharing, stop by the county ASCS Office. If you wish to plant trees without cost-sharing, contact the County Division of Forestry, Box 337, Morehead, Ky. 40351.
