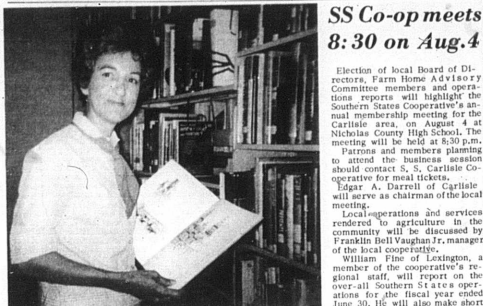

Gates, who joined the company as a sales representative in March, 1969, was promoted to sales management only seven months after that time.

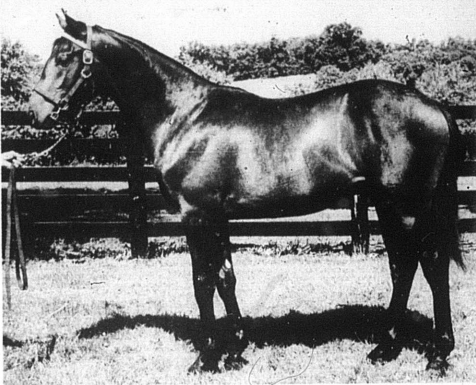
During his few years with the company, Gates has repeatedly won company-wide recognition for his outstanding accomplishments and leadership qualities in his work.

The County ASCS Committee, Vocational Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service and Extension Service will hold a Joint County Field Day on the Clay Seed Farm and the Harold Letton Farm, Thursday, Aug. 3. The Deposit Bank, First National Bank and Production Credit Association will provide lunch for those attending.

The Field Day will start at the Clay Seed Farm, on the Walnut Grove Road, at 10:00 a.m. Ira Massey will assist with the tobacco program. The tour will move to the Harold Letton Farm on the Carpenter Pike at 11:30 a.m. where James Smith will have a group of production tested Angus bulls where performance testing will be discussed. After lunch, the group will tour the Letton Farm and see Kenstar Red Clover, two new summer cover crops seeded on tobacco plant beds, soil test, contour farming and strip cropping, pasture development, livestock water system and a tree planting made during the 1970's.

The theme of the Field Day will be "Modern Farm Practices and How They Contribute to the Welfare of All Nicholas Counties". Farm families as well as business people are invited to the Field Day Program.

## Budget helps county

On March 15, with the endorsement of both houses of the legislature, the Governor signed the budget for the 1972-74 biennium into law.

Under its provisions, Nicholas county residents may expect to see increased expenditures in the school foundation program, public assistance programs, and state and highway services as well as additional monies for local health programs.

For instance, county schools will receive \$72,000 more during the 1972-74 biennium than in the previous one, a 4.6 per cent increase.

Public assistance funds will be increased locally by 15 per cent with increased \$10,015 in state money appropriated.

Local health funds have been increased by three per cent with \$15,734 allotted for the 1972-74 biennium.

Governor Ford said these specific are indicative of overall aims of his administration which is to serve people.
