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Want that old 'heap' moved?

Got an old "junker", that is, a motor vehicle?
If you have a motor vehicle that's taking up valuable space and you wish it removed FREE of CHARGE the problem is solved. Should you abandon a motor vehicle on the county's right-of-way, then under a new law effective June 16, any motor vehicle can be red tagged, then seven days later picked up.

As well as private property, Mr. Ballard stated that he is finishing up work begun sometime ago in Bourbon county where he estimates he has picked up 1,000 motor vehicles.
As stated previously there is no charge for picking up the vehicles on roads or private property. Anyone having a vehicle they wish removed should call the Nicholas County Clerk's office, 289-3391, giving the location of the vehicle to be removed.

soon as possible, will be notified by J. Berry Burnaw, county clerk. Signs would not be feasible tags from one end of the county to the other. Ballard of course will determine his starting point, but it is imperative that persons wishing vehicles removed, call the clerk's office as soon as possible.
The Carlisle Rotary Club endorsed this project at its July 27 meeting and Henry Peters, club president, stated he would write a letter or fiscal court writing, them for their efforts.
It is hoped that all civic organizations will get behind this ecological project.

Area mail processing effective here Monday

Lodge Fish Fry

The annual Dougherty Lodge fish fry will be held Saturday, Aug. 5, at 6:30 p.m., in the cafeteria at Blue Grass Industries. All members of Dougherty Lodge and their families are invited to attend.

The Carlisle Post Office will become part of a new concept in mailing, handling Aug. 7 when an "Area Mail Processing" plan goes into effect in Lexington and 16 surrounding post offices.
Postmaster John R. Anderson said, the program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of mail through maximum utilization of Lexington's modern mail processing machines.
"By sending mail to a central point, we can give our customers faster deliveries while cutting our costs," Mr. Anderson added.
The principal idea behind the program is to transport all non-local mail from the 16 participating offices to Lexington for post-marking, cancelling, sorting and dispatch. Such mail will receive a postmark reading "U.S. Postal Service 403" rather than Carlisle.
"However," said Mr. Anderson,

"we want to mislead about postmarking. Any person or firm that asks for a Carlisle Postmark will get it." Mr. Anderson cautioned against using the word "City" on mail addressed for local delivery in Carlisle. He said, the mail should have Carlisle as part of the address.
Although there may be some personnel transfers in the area, Mr. Anderson said that he had been assured by Bremer Ehrler, manager of the Louisville District, that the change would not mean a loss of job for any career employees, and that all seniority rights would be respected.
Also, effective Aug. 7, 1972, there will be two mail boxes in front of the Post Office building, one marked "Carlisle and Local Postmark"; the other box marked, "Out of Town".

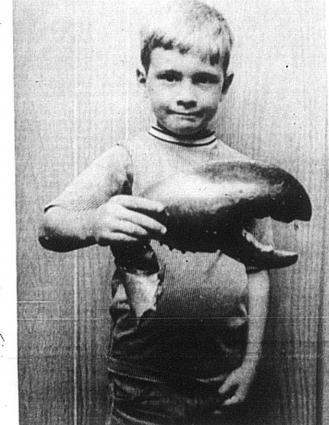

Gov. Ford approves Licking Valley (CAA) grants

Gov. Wendell H. Ford announced his approval of a \$100,000 incentive grant to be awarded to the Licking Valley Community Action Agency (CAA).
The grant, from the Office of Economic Opportunity, Boston, Ky., Atlanta, is a one-time funding to implement a project designed to establish an inter-agency planning group for the development of a total area plan to include the counties of Bath, Montgomery, and Menfiesville.
It will also, assist the Licking Valley CAA in achieving continuous boundaries for the CAA and Area Development Districts (ADDs) as mandated by the 1972 Kentucky State Legislature.
Frank Hammond is executive director of the Licking Valley CAA which also includes the counties of Bracken, Fleming, Mason,

Nicholas, and Robertson. The central office is located in Flemingsburg.
Gov. Ford also approved a \$5,000 supplemental grant from the federal Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) to a Northeastern Kentucky anti-poverty agency for the purchase of additional family planning supplies.
The purchase of the supplemental grant to the Licking Valley Community Action Agency (CAA) is to enable its family planning program to offer such a variety of contraceptive supplies that more than just two birth control methods, represented by the two different types of pills supplied by the state, will be available to clients.
Family planning is just one of several programs operated by the CAA, which is also directed by Frank Hammond.

Poll shows optimism toward economy and concern on labor, taxes

Kentucky business leaders have expressed optimism that the economy will continue to expand at an increasing rate, in response to a question relating to confidence for the economy to expand at a rate greater than recently experienced, 66 percent of business leaders recently polled were "optimistic" or "very optimistic" while 28 percent thought economic expansion would be "about the same" and only six percent expressed pessimism.

other issues of major concern were unemployment, political participation, workmen's compensation, unemployment compensation, executive environmental controls and governmental reorganization.
The business leaders polled included manufacturers, financial concerns, utilities, services, insurance, wholesale, retail, transportation and organizations, among others.
