The Christian Evangelists Association produces a weekly television series called "Revival Fires". "Revival Fires" can be seen in this area on WLXZ-TV at 8:30 Sunday morning and on WKRC-TV at 12:00 noon on Sunday. Lowell Mason is featured regularly on the program.

The proceeds of these bonds will be used to retire on Dec. 15, 1980 the callable bonds of the previously issued County of Nicholas, Kentucky school Building Revenue Bonds dated June 15, 1970.

Since the interest cost of the refunding bonds is considerably less than the interest cost of the bonds to be called to 1980, the taxpayers of Nicholas County will realize a savings of over \$143,000.
