Girls state at MSU

More than 300 high school girls are expected to participate June 11-17 in the 26th annual Kentucky Girls State at Morehead State University.

The week-long exercise democracy is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Kentucky.

Each delegate is a high school senior and will become a citizen of a mythical 51st state. Elections will be held to select officials on all levels of government and will culminate in the election of a Kentucky Girls State governor.

The delegates will be representatives of senators in the Kentucky Girls State Assembly and will travel to Frankfort on Friday, June 16, to operate their government.

Gov. Wendell Ford will address the group in Frankfort.

Mrs. H.W. Richardson of Louisville is director of the 1972 Kentucky Girls State. Mrs. J. Emerson Lewis of Lexington is the chairman of the board and Mrs. R.T. Barrett of Ashland is director of education for the group. This is the second consecutive year that Kentucky Girls State has met at MSU.

Abducted youth escapes; FBI, others seek four Ga. escapees in area

A search got underway in Nicholas County and Northeastern Kentucky Sunday afternoon for four escapees from a Jonesboro, Ga., jail who abducted a Jonesboro man Saturday afternoon.

Carlisle police said the men abducted Mike LaChapella, 23, at a creek near Jonesboro where he was fishing, and forced him to drive them northward. The creek was near a Baptist Summer Camp where LaChapella was a swimming instructor and was thus wearing only swimming trunks at the time of abduction.

The abductors drove to a house in Nicholas County, reportedly, relatives of one of the escapees, Larry Craig, when the men thought

LaChapella had gotten away, they left the farm house where he was hidden and then a woman left the house to call the police.

Local and state police immediately started a search for the men and the FBI also joined in the investigation.

While at the Carlisle Police Station LaChapella was given proper clothing and food by Alec Crawford, and while awaiting FBI investigators, though nervous, talked freely of his experiences of the two days to Custer Blair and Dr. S. Evans Brown who offered their help.

On Sunday night LaChapella's father arranged for his son's flight home.

Rural secondary road program is announced

Governor Wendell H. Ford and Highway Commissioner Charles Pryor Jr., today announced the 1972 Rural Secondary program for Nicholas county. The county's share of Rural Secondary roads is in doubt of their acreages the ASCO office offers, at a small cost, a set-aside inspection and measurement service. This service provides farmers ahead of time a guarantee of their set-aside acreages.

The program selected provides maintenance for 46.3 miles of Rural Secondary roads. It also authorizes blacktop resurfacing for 4.0 miles of KY 1058, 1.5 miles of the Whetstone Road; and 2.8 miles of the Saltwell-Quarters Road; and survey for two cutovers and approaches on KY 1255, the East Union Road.

The Rural Secondary Program is supported by two cents of the Commonwealth's motor fuel tax. It originated in 1948 when the General Assembly recognized the need to improve farm-to-market and other rural roads. To insure fair distribution among the various counties, it enacted a statutory formula in 1962. This formula, which takes rural population, rural area and rural road mileage into account, determines each county's share.

The total revenue which the program anticipates for the coming fiscal year is \$34,960,000. Commis is a former Pryor aid. "This program permits the Department of Highways to maintain and upgrade many of the "people roads" to which Governor Ford assigns priority."

Nicholas county ADA makes funds available

The Nicholas County American Dairy Auxiliary has announced that this year they will make available \$100 for the use of the Nicholas county churches in their Vacation Bible Schools.

Each church who wishes to be a part of this program should provide some milk product as a refreshment for their VBS for one year. Only milk products will be furnished by the NCADA.

The director of each of the Vacation Bible Schools should make available a copy of the bill for the refreshments purchased to Rev. H. Dallas Sugg at least 10 days before the start of the Vacation Bible School. Rev. Sugg is treasurer for the Nicholas County Ministerial Association. The account will be either paid to the director of the school or to the store that supplies the milk product refreshments.

Mrs. Edgar Scott is the county chairman for the Nicholas County American Dairy Auxiliary and Mrs. Joe Allen Stone is the secretary-treasurer. These ladies, along with their local committees, have arranged to subsidize what has been given by the American Dairy Association for this project. They feel that their gift should make available for each Vacation Bible School a 10 cent milk product refreshment for every boy and girl enrolled in VBS in Nicholas county this year.
