Boling said a .22-caliber pistol was found near Martin. The gun, the sheriff said, had been borrowed by Martin from a friend.

Martin, a native of Bourbon county, made his home with his parents, Herman and Glisette Lee Mattox Martin, of the Clintonville Road.

He was a veteran of World War II and a former employee of the Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot operation at Avon.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Martin; a sister, Mrs. Daniel I. Crimes, Nicholas County, and a brother, Leslie Martin, Bourbon County.

Services were conducted Tuesday at the Lusk Funeral Chapel with burial in the Paris Cemetery.

The accident occurred about 5:30 p.m. on Upper Sharpburg Road about 8 1/2 miles east of Carlisle.

'70 Census shows average family income is \$6,572

Average family income was \$6,572 in Nicholas county in 1970, compared with \$7,441 for the State, according to a report on the 1970 census by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. Per capita income for the county amounted to \$2,138, the report shows.

The 1970 census counted 6,508 residents in the county; zero percent were foreign born and 0.1 percent native born with one or both parents of foreign birth.

Among the county's 5,952 households age 5 and over in 1970, 651 were living in a different county within the State in 1965, and 137 in a different state.
