35 local people attend U of K ag. open house

More than 35 persons from Carlisle attended the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture open house and barbecue dinner on Thursday from 3 to 8 p.m. at Splendidop Research Center, sponsored by the College and 22 Central Kentucky banks. The activities included farm tours, Agriculture and consumer show, dinner and a guest speaker. The speaker was William Erwin deputy undersecretary for Rural Development, U.S.D.A. Mr. Erwin stressed the point that the development of rural America is in the hands of rural residents. He said that the importance of the growth of U.S. rural areas, Mr. Erwin declared. "Local leadership will increasingly be the crucial factor" in its development. "Our agency is behind you, the government is behind you, but it's in your hands," he told the gathering that at times numbered 1,200. The participants were from a 17-county area represented by the UK Extension Service in the Blue Grass and Ft. Harrod districts.

4H Style Revue Saturday, June 24

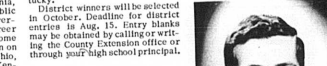
