Since chicken continues to be the most economical meat on the market, don't you think it's about time to try something really different? Here's how you can make a Chicken Moussé. It makes a nice summer dish for guests and can be made the day before, frozen a complete summer dinner fixed the day before, and no matter how hot, you can serve a well balanced meal, cool and calm.

Try this menu: Chicken Moussé, Harvard Beets (for color), Garden Salad of delicate Bibb lettuce, sliced hard cooked egg, and about five spears of green asparagus for each serving) fresh from the garden if possible. If not use canned. Garnish with carrot curls and rose radishes. Use your choice of dressing. For dessert, Chocolate Pecan Pie.

Actually the only thing served with this meal would be the beets, but they can be prepared the day before and heated at serving time. You serve your favorite ice cream, hot French bread, coffee, buttered and sprinkled with smooth, Chiff. stirring occasionally, until mixture is slightly thickened. Add chicken, thyme and onion.

HARVARD BEETS (Sweet-Sour)

- 3 cups beets, cooked
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup mild vinegar
- 2 whole eggs
- Slice or dice beets for use canned, small whole beets). Mix the sugar, cornstarch and salt together, add vinegar, cook and stir until clear. Add the beets and place over hot water for 30 minutes. Heat before serving and add the butter and heat, but do not boil.

CHOCOLATE PECAN PIE FOR BOX CARE

- 1/2 cup butter (1 stick)
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar (sifted)
- 2 whole eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Cream butter, add sugar, cream thoroughly. Add 1 whole egg, beat well again, add the second egg. Beat thoroughly. Add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and 1/4 teaspoon salt.
- Line a cake pan or pie pan with rolls. You serve your favorite ice cream, hot French bread, coffee, buttered and sprinkled with smooth, Chiff. stirring occasionally, until mixture is slightly thickened. Add chicken, thyme and onion.

CHICKEN MOUSSE

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 envelope cold chicken broth (10-15)
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise (optional)
- 1/2 cup finely chopped chicken

Soften gelatin in chicken broth. Add chicken, mayonnaise and sour cream. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

"Pierre the Pelican" writes to parents

"Pierre the Pelican" is a children's storybook character. He's fictional, all right, but he works for the Kentucky Department of Mental Health.

Pierre writes to parents about raising their children.

His newsletters are part of a complete newsletter program providing advice to first-time parents concerning child rearing from both the standpoint of the child and that of the parent.

The four-year informational service consists of a series of 100 newsletters. The first two of which reach new mothers within a few days of their delivery. The series, written in direct, easy-to-read conversational tone, discuss the current developmental stage of a child according to his age and looks ahead to the next stage.

The child-care series was originated by Dr. Loyd W. Rowland, director of the Louisville and Lexington Mental Health, Dr. Benjamin Spock and other child experts were consulted in its preparation.

The Pierre series is anything but new. In the 14 years during which Kentucky has used these newsletters, they have been sent to more than 252,000 parents. Some 10,000 messages are mailed annually from Frankfort to 18,000 parents. The cost to the state runs about \$2 per child for the four-year period.

The philosophy reflected in the series is that a mentally healthy child is one who is raised without destroying themselves. Parents should grow through the experience of rearing a child, and the state should send additional messages Pierre urges parents to
