1971 audit submitted to City Monday 'More utilities revenue needed'

"The City is not receiving enough money from utility rates to pay expenses," this statement was made several times Monday night at City Council meeting, as Alvin Nolan of Potter, Hinkle, Sugg and Mahan accountants read the City Audit for 1971.

The audit was accepted unanimously by Council after Nolan presented it to the City body.

Utility rates have recently been raised by Council but, of course, these increases would not appear in rates charged for utilities. He did say that the trash collection was paying for itself with a total income last year of \$15,682.

After accepting the audit, City Clerk Robert J. Donohoe read reports which indicated that the City operating account would be \$3,471 in the red before the end of June.

767 people on food program in County

ATLANTA, Ga.—There were 767 low-income Nicholas county people on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's donated food program in March as compared to 739 the previous month. USDA's Food and Nutrition Service reports.

Taking the state as a whole, it was noted, there was a slight gain in the number of Kentucky people on the food assistance program. The number on the food stamp program was up by 1,258 while the total receiving donated food was down slightly to give an overall increase of 1,062.

In the food stamp program, now in operation in 73 Kentucky counties, 303,874 people were issued \$7.8 million in food coupons. Of this amount, \$5.5 million was in free or bonus stamps.

The remaining counties that operate food distribution programs distributed 1.8 million pounds of USDA-donated food to 53,410 needy people in March.

4 accused kidnapers caught

Four men accused of kidnaping Mike LaChappelle and forcing him to drive them to Nicholas county, were arrested at Atlanta, Ala., after an all-night manhunt, the FBI said Tuesday, June 13.

The FBI's Birmingham office said one of the men, Leonard Hoyt Modera, an escapee from a Georgia jail, was arrested Monday in a car allegedly stolen in Georgia.

A spokesman said a manhunt organized by Etowah county Sheriff Dewey Colvard, state troopers and federal agents resulted in the other three men—all escapees from the Georgia jail—being caught in a wooded area early Tuesday.

The three were identified by the FBI as Stephen Herbert Wallace, Larry Craig and Mike Moore. In addition to escape charges, the men are accused of kidnaping Joseph Michael Chappelle at Indianapolis in Jonesboro, Ga., last Saturday. He escaped shortly after arriving in Nicholas county on Sunday, June 11.

The FBI said the four men were being held in Etowah county jail at Gadsden pending a hearing before a U.S. Magistrate.
