Can a clothes dryer be vented into an existing chimney?
No clothes dryer, gas or electric, should be connected to a chimney, flue or vent serving another appliance. The moisture from clothes dryers should be exhausted outdoors to keep the air inside the house from becoming moisture saturated.

Is it true that clothes dryers cause white clothes to turn yellow?
Discoloration of clothes is usually due to improper laundry procedures, such as soap or detergent buildup caused by inadequate rinsing. The heat of any dryer will cause discoloring if proper laundry procedures are not followed.

To avoid yellowing, do not overload the washer, use the recommended measured amount of soap or detergent in the wash water and be sure the clothes are thoroughly rinsed.
What's fault is it when permanent press sheets wrinkle badly during ironing—the manufacturer of the sheets or the laundry appliance?
If your clothes dryer does not have a permanent press cycle, or if hot lines aren't removed from the dryer as soon as the dryer stops, wrinkling will occur.

Many strikingly similar proverbs crop up in widely separated parts of the world, the National Geographic Society says.

The Chinese say that too many bricklayers build a lopsided house, echoing the English belief that too many cooks spoil the broth and the Russian fear that too many hands will mar the soup.

Anthropologists believe proverbs were man's first great attempt at abstract thinking, and before deductive reasoning. When civilization reaches the proverb stage, it has the beginnings of philosophy, ethics, and law.
The importance of proverbs in a primitive society is summed up by a West African saying:

Thirty-one states and the District of Columbia have passed anti-bald fire laws. Industry and government safety experts define a bald tire as one with tread worn down to 1/16 inch as measured in two or more adjacent grooves.

Figures showing the change that has taken place since 1960 in ownership of household equipment are based upon a sample survey made by the Commerce Department and upon data from other sources.

The rising proportion of two-car families is one sign of better living. In Nicholas county, it appears, no less than 25.7 percent of the households have two cars or more. This compares with 17.1 percent in 1960.

Similarly, food freezers as well as refrigerators are now to be found in more local homes than ever before. Approximately 85.9 percent of the families in the local regional area now own them.
As for television sets, they have become an accepted fact in most Nicholas county homes. In 89.0 percent of them last year there was at least one set, as against 66.7 percent in 1960.

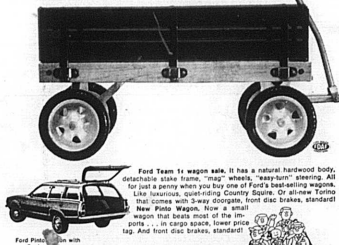
as a souvenir, and promise not to cash it."
Marion O'Donohue, a former Revenue employee and now parliament supervisor for the state Racing Commission, said the high number of uncashed tickets results partially from people accidentally throwing away or discarding the tickets too soon.

"After a race, bettors may throw their tickets away, only to realize later a disqualification has been made in the race," said O'Donohue. "Their horse then may be placed in the money after the disqualification, but the ticket has already been lost."

Many people, called "stoppers," make a living from such discarded tickets.
"At every track there will be a lot of people who go around and pick up tickets off the ground," said O'Donohue, whose father rode Leonard to victory in the 1883 Kentucky Derby. "It's impossible to say how many good tickets are found this way, but the stoppers work hard at making a living off others' mistakes."

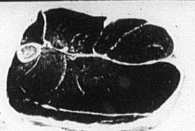
