FRANKFORT—Where do Kentucky Democrats go now? That is an apt question after Sen. George McGovern's smashing victory in the New York primary that brought him within 250 delegate votes necessary for the first ballot nomination for the presidency at the party's Miami convention next month.

It was only Monday of last week that Kentucky's Democratic Gov. Wendell Ford threw Kentucky's 37 Louisville delegate vote to Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine at a Louisville rally. The governor, who was suffering from a back ailment, to drive to Louisville to deliver the delegate votes to Muskie. The Senator had withdrawn from primaries early in the campaign, but stayed in the race "to the delegates a choice" at Miami. Muskie was portraying himself as the "unity candidate" who could unite the various elements of his party while McGovern was gathering delegate votes like bunches of grapes in primary after primary.

of the governor. State Party Chairman J.R. Miller and the governor both wanted the entire delegation to the national convention elected on the non-committed basis, but McGovern forces were successful in winning 10 of the state's 47 delegates.

Gov. Ford has been quoted as saying that McGovern's extreme position jeopardizes the chances of U.S. Senate and Congressional seats for Democrats in Kentucky this November. The governor has been pushing an effort to get McGovern to change position on withdrawal of the defense budget.

nominee Walter Dee Huddleston, majority leader of the state Senate, has not made any public criticism of the governor's position or statement about nomination "hampering Huddleston's chances" as McGovern's former Republican Gov. Louis B. Nunn, informed sources close to Huddleston have failed to do so. On top of all of this, the wire services reported last Wednesday that Senator Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts said "there are no circumstances under which I would accept a nomination for any national office this year."

In this a way for the aggressive and ambitious action of the Kennedy clan it says that Democrats don't have a chance to win office this year.

He knows if a Democrat wins in November that he would not have a chance to win the office for another eight years. But, if President Nixon wins this year, he would have a chance in 1976 for the highest office in the land. His boss Humphrey will be out of his office this year.

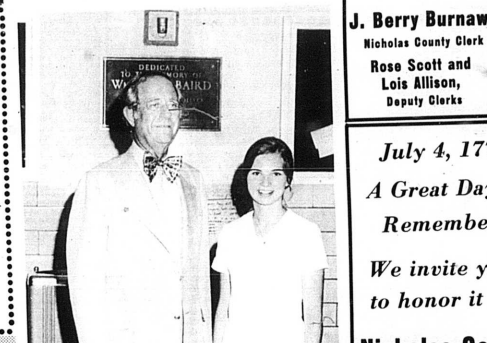
A history of Nicholas County Courthouses

The first county seat in Nicholas county was located at Bedinger's Mill on the Licking River at Elk Creek in 1800, and remained there until 1804. No courthouse was built there.

The second county seat was established on the Lexington and Mayfield Road on the James Ellis farm and named Ellenville, in 1805. It was replaced by a third brick courthouse which was dedicated July 4, 1804.

(Editor's Note: This corrects a "History of Kentucky Courthouses" which was recently published. On page 125 of the new book, it states that the Old Stone Tavern was a courthouse which it was not. It also says that the second Nicholas County Courthouse was built in 1810, it was later used as a tavern and stagecoach stop.

The third county seat was established on the Great Road between Upper Blue Licks and Millersburg in 1816, and named Carlisle. William McClanahan
