

# Kay's Kitchen

Here we are again ready to celebrate July 4 with a special menu for a cook-out. Since most everyone has had hamburgers all through the year, why not try just beyond chicken.

Get your congenial crowd together and let everyone help with the grill. It takes an hour and a half or longer to barbecue chicken, so take each one a turn at basting it with your favorite marinade or barbecue sauce. For the adults in the crowd you had better be prepared and have one half chicken for each one. If the children go for barbecue, have legs and thighs for them. Naturally they will get done first. Good, then serve the children and when they are satisfied you can enjoy your meal more.

(Here are two sauces that go well with chicken. Check the last of tomato sauce. This makes a nice change.)

**HERB BARBECUE SAUCE**  
 1/2 cup olive oil or salad oil  
 1/2 cup margarine  
 2 1/2 cups white wine  
 1 teaspoon rosemary, crushed  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper  
 1 clove of garlic, minced  
 Combine oil, margarine, wine, rosemary, salt, pepper and garlic in small saucepan. Heat over medium heat until bubbling hot. Brush chicken halves inside and out with sauce. Grill about 6 inches from coals and grill about an hour basting and turning often.  
 This serves four but it is simple to double this recipe.

**OIL AND VINEGAR SAUCE**  
 1 egg  
 2 cups cider vinegar  
 1 cup salad oil  
 3 tablespoons salt  
 1 tablespoon poultry seasoning  
 1 teaspoon pepper  
 Beat egg, then beat in vinegar, oil, salt, poultry seasoning and

pepper. Marinate chicken halves in marinade about 30 minutes, then grill. Cook chicken on grill over medium hot coals about an hour, turning frequently and basting with sauce after each turn. Enough sauce to make 6 to 8 servings.

Scrub potatoes, cut thin slices from each end. Cook in salted water until done. Peel, dice and mix with potatoes are still warm. Add more mayonnaise if necessary. Potatoes marinated in salad chilis. Really add enough until it looks like there is a little too much. (Instead of more mayonnaise the addition of bottled dressing gives a delightful flavor.) Add strips of pimento over salad.

**BOILED DRESSING**  
 2 whole eggs  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 3/4 cup water  
 1/4 cup vinegar  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon dry mustard  
 1/4 teaspoon onion salt  
 To dry ingredients add egg, butter, water and vinegar. Mix carefully. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. For a more tart flavor, add a bit more vinegar.

Combine cabbage, carrot, onion and green pepper, sprinkle with sugar and salt. Add vinegar and salad dressing; mix well. Should serve 10 or 12.

**POTATO SALAD**  
 8 medium potatoes  
 1 cup mayonnaise  
 1 1/2 tablespoons pickle relish, chopped  
 1/2 cup sliced onion  
 1/2 cup chopped celery  
 2 tablespoons chopped onion or more  
 3 hard boiled eggs  
 Salt and pepper to taste  
 Pimento, cut in strips

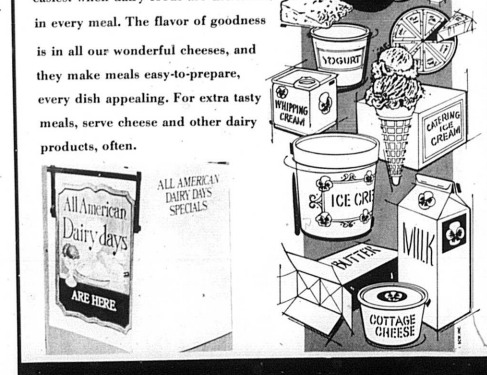

Mrs. Gray has been an employee of Blue Grass Industries for 20 years and a member of the Thorobred Club for five years.

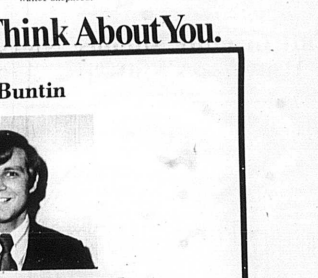
**Class of 1922 to hold reunion**
